1 CHAIRMAN HANSON: Docket EL13-028, In The 2 Matter Of The Application Of Montana-Dakota Utilities 3 And Otter Tail Power Company For A Permit To Construct 4 The Big Stone South To Ellendale 345 kV Transmission 5 Line. 6 The questions before the Commission are today 7 shall the Commission grant the Motion For Leave To Submit 8 Documentary Evidence? 9 And shall the Commission grant the Joint Motion 10 For Approval of Settlement Stipulation and approve the Amended Settlement Stipulation as the basis for its final 11 12 decision and order? 13 Or how shall the Commission proceed? 14 We will hear from all of the parties, including 15 those who are Interveners or represented. And we will 16 begin with MDU and OTP. And we have -- good afternoon. 17 We also have folks who have phoned in. 18 Mr. Welk, are you lead counsel --19 MR. WELK: Yes. I'm representing --20 CHAIRMAN HANSON: Lead counsel. 21 MR. WELK: (Inaudible). 22 MR. SMITH: Is your mic. on, Tom? 23 MR. WELK: Better? All right. Thank you. 24 The first Motion is the Motion For Leave To 25 Submit Documentary Evidence.

We ask that the Commission consider as part of the administrative record in here Exhibits 26 and 26A and Exhibit 301A.

Exhibit 26 and 26A relate to Intervener 4 5 Brad Morehouse's request of a route change. If you 6 recall, at the administrative hearing there was testimony 7 about several proposed route changes. The project was 8 uncertain as to what these changes were, and so they went 9 out and spoke with him, Mr. Schuring, and you'll see that 10 there was a letter that was written to him, which is 11 Exhibit 26 dated July 15, 2014, to both Mr. Schuring and 12 Mr. Morehouse, along with 26A, which was a map that was 13 signed by Mr. Schuring and Mr. Morehouse as to confirming 14 what their proposed reroutes were.

And after that the process that we described in the evidentiary hearing of looking at the reroutes was undertaken by the project. So these represent the actions by the project in regard to Exhibits 26 and 26A.

Exhibit 301A is the Amended Settlement
Stipulation with the Staff. At the evidentiary hearing
there were questions asked by the Commissioners regarding
the Settlement Stipulation that was originally filed with
the Joint Motion For Approval.

24 Subsequent to the Commission's evidentiary 25 hearing we prepared an Amended Stipulation, which we 4

1 believed was consistent with what -- the discussion that happened at the evidentiary hearing, provided a red line 2 3 copy of the changes to the original Stipulation and ask that 301A be included as part of the record. 4 So I would move for the admission of 5 6 Exhibits 26, 26A, and 301A. 7 CHAIRMAN HANSON: Is there any objection from 8 any of the parties for these items to be entered as exhibits? 9 10 MR. PESALL: No. 11 CHAIRMAN HANSON: Thank you. Hearing no 12 objections, they are accepted as exhibits. 13 MR. WELK: Mr. Morehouse is on the line. I 14 think he should be asked if he had any objections. 15 CHAIRMAN HANSON: I thought I was doing that as 16 I was. 17 MR. MOREHOUSE: Excuse me. This is Brad 18 Morehouse. 19 CHAIRMAN HANSON: Go ahead, Mr. Morehouse. 20 MR. MOREHOUSE: Thank you. I'm not really understanding what you're actually trying to do today 21 22 with the exhibit or if you're voting on approval of the 2.3 project or what. But my thought -- and they were out and 24 they looked at different routes --25 CHAIRMAN HANSON: Mr. Morehouse. Mr. Morehouse.

MOREHOUSE: I do not. 13 CHAIRMAN HANSON: Thank you, sir. 14 MR. PESALL: No objection from Mr. Pesall. 15 CHAIRMAN HANSON: Thank you. Mr. Pesall is 16 represented by counsel, and counsel does not object to 17 it. 18 Please continue. MR. WELK: Well, that concludes the two motions 19 20 that were set as part of the agenda item. The 21 discussion, not the voting. The discussion. 22 CHAIRMAN HANSON: Correct. Thank you. 23 I'm reading to see whether or not I've 24 trespassed my position as Chairman here. 25 The first question being shall the Commission

It states 9 shall the Commission grant the Motion For Leave To Submit 10 Documentary Evidence. And as the Chair, normally we turn over the 11 12 process to counsel to run it when we're going through 13 a -- an evidentiary hearing. And having presented the 14 evidence, I took it upon myself to accept that since 15 there was no objection. 16 I'm wondering, that question that was placed 17 there, did I overstep my bounds as Chairman? Do we need 18 to --19 MR. SMITH: I don't think so. I mean, if the 20 Commission feels uncomfortable about it, go ahead and 21 vote on it. But I'm not hearing anyone step and say --22 usually when I rule in the hearing, the ruling I make 23 stands unless the Commissioners object to my ruling. 2.4 So that said, I think your actions --25 CHAIRMAN HANSON: Thank you.

1 MR. SMITH: You've already taken action. 2 CHAIRMAN HANSON: Just want to make sure we do 3 it properly. And I don't see either one of my 4 Commissioners objecting to it. 5 So without objection, they are accepted as 6 exhibits. Thank you. That will turn to the second 7 8 question. And, Mr. Welk. 9 MR. WELK: That's the approval of the 10 Stipulation? 11 CHAIRMAN HANSON: Correct. 12 MR. WELK: We went into quite detail on this at 13 the evidentiary hearing. This Stipulation as amended by 14 the Commissioners' questions represent the agreement 15 between the project and the Staff as to additional terms 16 and conditions that would be placed on the project should 17 the Commission grant the facility permit. 18 The questions were asked at the evidentiary 19 hearing about all of those terms and conditions, and so 20 we would ask that if the Commission does grant the 21 permit, that these terms and conditions be included. 22 Thank you. And I will hear CHAIRMAN HANSON: 23 from Interveners at this juncture on that question. 24 MR. PESALL: Excuse me. 25 CHAIRMAN HANSON: Did he leave his notes for

1 you? MR. PESALL: He did actually. They look like 2 ones that I've already been served with and printed many 3 4 copies in the office. 5 This is Bob Pesall. I'm an attorney for 6 Gerald Pesall. As the Commissioners know, he's my uncle. 7 He has throughout this process been very happy with the 8 thoroughness that the Commission has applied to this and 9 the other proceedings that he's had the opportunity to 10 witness. 11 Mr. Welk has not burdened the Commission with a 12 lengthy argument, and I don't anticipate doing so either. I would ask the Commission on behalf of Mr. Pesall to 13 14 deny the Motion that's pending and to deny the permit at 15 this point. 16 The reasons behind it primarily are that we 17 don't feel that the proposed project is really in the 18 interest of the public in South Dakota, particularly the folks that live in the siting area. 19 20 The testimony went on at length about the 21 interference that this is likely to cause with farms and 22 development in the area and that there wasn't evidence in 23 the record that really rebutted that. 2.4 In addition, there was lengthy testimony -- I 25 learned more about soybeans during this process than I

1 ever anticipated existed in the scope of human knowledge. 2 But we just have huge concerns about what's going to be 3 done if this project is built maybe not this time around 4 if the permit's denied but at some point in the future if 5 they revise the Application and try again in six months 6 or a year.

7 What do you do with 30 cubic yards of 8 contaminated soil for each and every individual tower? 9 How do you really intend to go about cleaning off the 10 equipment between each one of these construction sites?

11 In the proposed terms and conditions that have 12 been set forth they incorporate by reference the 13 mitigation plan. The mitigation plan has a sampling 14 method that a person can go out and look at and say 15 they're following their obligations there. Beyond that, 16 there isn't enough information for the Commission or 17 individual citizens to go out there and judge whether 18 they're doing it right.

That, combined with the other issues it creates for the farmers in the area, we think really does create a serious risk of damage to the environment. And damage to the environment for a farmer means damage to your social and economic status. It means damage to the orderly development of the area.

Staff. 1 Staff would echo the comments of the Applicant 2 3 and recommend that the Commission grant the Joint Motion 4 For Approval of the Amended Settlement Stipulation and 5 adopt the attached Amended Settlement Stipulation without 6 modification. 7 I would note that the Commission's general 8 practice, their usual practice, is to write their own 9 Findings of Fact and Conclusions of Law so any problems 10 with the Applicant's proposed Findings of Fact and 11 Conclusions of Law are resolved by that practice. 12 Staff further believes that an appropriate 13 balance of the parties' interests has been reached and 14 the conditions address those issues that were raised by 15 the landowners in this matter. And Staff's analysts are 16 available should you have any questions. 17 Thank you. 18 CHAIRMAN HANSON: Thank you very much, Ms. Cremer. 19 20 Turn to Commissioners at this time to see if the 21 Commissioners have any questions that they have of any of 22 the parties. 23 Commissioner Nelson. 24 COMMISSIONER NELSON: Well, the first question 25 deals with a comment that Mr. Morehouse just made and if

14

1 I heard him correctly he said that his understanding was that the line had been moved a mile from the Schuring 2 dairy. That wasn't my understanding. 3 4 Mr. Ford, can you clarify whether there's been a 5 move or not? 6 MR. FORD: There has not been an official move. 7 We have been continuing to look at options for the line 8 in this area. And we do have a potential reroute that 9 would move the line an additional mile from the Schuring 10 farm. 11 However, we don't have any options signed on that reroute. We don't know if we have any landowner --12 13 COMMISSIONER NELSON: Okay. And you have not 14 filed anything with us. I was thinking I had missed 15 something, but I have not missed something. 16 MR. FORD: That's correct. No, we have not. 17 COMMISSIONER NELSON: Okay. I just maybe want 18 to raise -- Mr. Chairman, are we at the point of kind of 19 laying our cards on the table as to what concerns we 20 might have or how do you want to proceed? 21 CHAIRMAN HANSON: Absolutely. I think that's 22 appropriate at this juncture. 23 COMMISSIONER NELSON: At this point I've really 24 only got two issues. One is an issue that Mr. Pesall 25 raised in his brief about the enforceability of the

2	And, Mr. Ford, you'll remember at the hearing I
3	asked about that. I said, you know, this plan doesn't
4	appear to be very detailed to me. And you gave some
5	assurances that there was a reason for that and it would
6	be fleshed out and it would be workable.
7	I don't have any doubt about that, but I think
8	Mr. Pesall makes a very valid argument that as it exists,
9	from our perspective it's probably not enforceable as a
10	matter of law.
11	And so one of the things that I would like to
12	see as a condition, should the permit be issued, would be
13	that a complete soybean nematode mitigation plan be filed
14	with the Commission, one that both the public and the
15	Commission have the ability to evaluate, is the company
16	complying with that detailed plan or not.
17	Is that something that you'd be willing to
18	accept?
19	MR. FORD: What would be the timing on that?
20	COMMISSIONER NELSON: Certainly prior to
21	construction.
22	MR. FORD: Okay. We have no problem there.
23	COMMISSIONER NELSON: Yeah. Because we
24	understand you're going to need to consult with your
25	experts and kind of figure out what's the best way to

move forward with this. And, yeah, it would take some time, it would seem to me, to be able to put that together. But I think from our responsibility to the people is to make sure that whatever we've asked of you is actually enforceable.

6 MR. FORD: Sure. Sure. I could add here too 7 that I think it was you, Commissioner Nelson, that asked 8 about whether or not we had talked to the Soybean Council 9 in this matter. And we had not at that time.

But we have since spoken with Adam Herges, who is with the Council, and had some conversation with him about the project and what, you know, we're trying to do and what this mitigation effort would look like.

He indicated that they -- you know, they're a resource that works with farmers to try to help them get the testing done in their own fields and so forth. So they don't have the expertise in-house.

18 But he did recommend to us that we visit with 19 Emmanuel Byamukama who's with SDSU. He's our SCN expert. 20 He's also an extension pathologist with SDSU. Emmanuel 21 was actually the individual that we had visited with 22 prior to the evidentiary hearing. And we have since had 23 further conversation with him, and presently we are in 24 the process of putting together a scope of work document 25 and ultimately a contract where we will use Emmanuel as

17

1 our expert to help us develop three things really. 2 He's going to consult initially on the sampling 3 plan itself so that we make sure that we do sampling in a 4 manner that provides the accurate, correct results. So 5 that would be the first step. 6 Then he has offered essentially the college's 7 resources to perform the actual sampling for us on the 8 project. And we're looking at that sampling being done 9 in the fall of 2015. So that's well in advance of 10 construction. 11 Once we have the sampling results, then -- and 12 they're going to be the ones that will also do the 13 analysis of the samples -- he's further agreeing to 14 consult with us on our specific mitigation plan, which 15 then would be based on the results that we see. 16 I think as we talked about at the evidentiary 17 hearing, the reason our plan was vague was because we saw 18 a lot of different options in there for what we may or 19 may not need to do. And depending on how much we see as 20 contaminated or noncontaminated, that's going to affect 21 really how we execute our mitigation. 22 I mean, certainly the simple thing is that you 23 do not bring contaminated soil from a field that has SCN 24 present to a field that does not. That's the simple 25 thing that you can say.

18

1 And then there's various ways to avoid doing that, which we talked about briefly in terms of what we 2 call a clean crew/dirty crew or potentially cleaning 3 4 equipment on site and those types of things. 5 So we're still, you know, looking to the good 6 doctor at SDSU to really -- as he is an expert in this 7 area, to help us determine what is the best and 8 presumably then most successful method of mitigation 9 here. 10 But we do believe, and he seems to agree, that 11 that mitigation plan is based on the results that we 12 find, not something that we can necessarily sit down 13 today. Although we could in general terms say, like I 14 said, we'll prevent the spread from contaminated to 15 noncontaminated fields. 16 COMMISSIONER NELSON: Right. I think it's the general terms that we want to avoid. So it sounds to me 17 18 like we're headed in the same direction, but when you get that that's what I think I'd like to have filed with us 19 20 so everybody's got access to that. 21 MR. FORD: Absolutely. So that means that that plan would probably be filed in late 2015 is what I would 22 2.3 guess at this point. 24 COMMISSIONER NELSON: I'm just going to turn --25 Mr. Smith, does that sound reasonable?

19

1 MR. SMITH: Yeah. And is this something that 2 you want -- I mean, do you want a condition in the -- in 3 the order that --4 COMMISSIONER NELSON: That would be my 5 presumption, yes. 6 MR. SMITH: That makes some level of, I guess, 7 added detail to what the current condition --8 COMMISSIONER NELSON: Right. And what he's 9 describing, I mean, that's what I think I'm looking for. 10 I mean, we're going the right direction. It's just a 11 matter of formalizing that and making sure that it's on 12 file with us. 13 MR. SMITH: Okay. Yes. I mean, I think I can 14 figure out what that -- you know, assuming that you vote 15 for it that I think I can write something up. Yes, it 16 is, but my head isn't in front of it. 17 Yeah. I think I'll be able to do that based 18 upon what Henry said and what the question was. 19 COMMISSIONER NELSON: Okay. Thank you. 20 Then the only other issue that I've got is the 21 issue that's kind of bubbled up the last couple days by 22 some of the folks who are affected but not Interveners. 23 Mr. Chairman, how do you want to handle that? 24 Are you going to take testimony from those folks? 25 I was -- I don't know that we CHAIRMAN HANSON:

1 need to get into necessarily an evidentiary hearing right 2 now because we can't really. But certainly they've 3 traveled a long ways, and we should hear from them. At the same time, the MDU and Otter Tail are 4 5 asking us to bench this, and if there's any concerns at 6 all, then we should have an additional hearing where 7 evidence is presented to us. 8 MR. That's not 16 evidence. 17 CHAIRMAN HANSON: Right. And what I'm alluding 18 to is Mr. Pesall's comments I'm going to ask him a 19 question on this too. But we're not done with this by 20 any means unless we accept the stipulations that have 21 been requested of us. So I think it's incumbent upon us to listen to 22 23 those folks now and then decide whether or not the 24 Interveners do have an opportunity to present that 25 evidence and have an evidentiary hearing.

1 So there's still loose ends to the octopus at 2 this point. COMMISSIONER NELSON: Okay. I think I'd be fine 3 4 as long as we can hear from them and then decide how to 5 proceed forward. 6 CHAIRMAN HANSON: Absolutely. We won't continue 7 without hearing from everyone. 8 Yes, Mr. Welk. 9 MR. WELK: Yes. I have a procedural issue. And 10 I certainly don't have any objections to have them be 11 heard. What we were referring to, for the purposes of 12 the record, is that there was a letter filed by 13 Mr. Podoll dated August 3, 2004 [sic] and also a letter 14 from Carol Rydberg, R-Y-D-B-E-R-G, dated 8-1-04. 15 And as Mr. Smith indicated, these are not 16 These were comments that were filed. Interveners. Т 17 just want to make an objection that the comments not be 18 included as part of the evidentiary record. That has 19 been concluded. 20 They had an opportunity to intervene in this 21 proceeding. The Commission provided multiple 22 opportunities to do so and was very -- we didn't object 23 to anybody who wanted to come in. 2.4 This submission is not under oath. It should 25 not be considered evidence. But these individuals are

22

1 citizens. They've come here. They should have a right 2 to talk. But I don't think it should be considered a 3 part of the evidentiary record, and we would object to 4 any consideration of their letters or comments being 5 considered part of the evidentiary record in this 6 proceeding. 7 But no objection to them stating their concerns 8 to the Commission. 9 CHAIRMAN HANSON: Thank you, Mr. Welk. 10 Would you object if Mr. Pesall presented 11 information of that nature from those folks and presented 12 it -- excuse me. 13 MR. WELK: You mean Mr. Pesall would act as a 14 lawyer in asking them questions? I don't understand. 15 CHAIRMAN HANSON: No. If he presented -- I'm 16 perhaps looking too far forward in this, but Mr. Pesall 17 might present some of that information in the questions that I ask of him. 18 19 And are you objecting to him presenting 20 information of that nature? Or will you want to wait for 21 that bridge? 22 MR. WELK: I'll wait to see what he offers. 23 I've made the general objection that that shouldn't be 24 considered. The evidentiary record is closed. And these 25 are not parties.

23

1 So I've made my objection on that, and it's up to the Chair to proceed. But, as I've said, the project 2 3 doesn't have any objection to listening to the comments. 4 But from a strictly legal standpoint the record is 5 closed. 6 CHAIRMAN HANSON: And that's the standard 7 operating procedure of this Commission is that only those 8 persons who are Interveners are allowed to present the 9 evidence; correct? 10 MR. SMITH: Well, yes. 11 And I think, you know, another side of that is, 12 you know, an evidentiary hearing has certain procedural 13 steps that need to be taken, such as we have to give 14 notice that there's going to be an evidentiary hearing. 15 And people need to have discovery option and -- you know, 16 I mean, we're just -- we're past that at this point. I 17 mean --18 CHAIRMAN HANSON: Nevertheless, we're being 19 asked to consider a final passage of this item. And if 20 Mr. Pesall presents information and it's -- it's 21 incumbent upon us to hear that. 22 MR. SMITH: Well, if we're going to hear it in 2.3 an evidentiary sense, then we've got to go through --2.4 CHAIRMAN HANSON: We'd have to have an ad hoc 25 and go through that process.

1 MR. SMITH: We'd have to serve notice, and we'd 2 have to have a hearing. We'd have to reopen the hearing 3 and begin again. 4 CHAIRMAN HANSON: Well, not begin again, but 5 yes --6 MR. SMITH: Right. 7 CHAIRMAN HANSON: Thank you. 8 Does that answer your question, or does that 9 confuse you? 10 COMMISSIONER NELSON: Here's the thing that -if I might, Mr. Chairman, you've referred to Mr. Pesall 11 12 several times, and it's not Mr. Pesall's issue that I 13 brought up. It's the Podoll issue that I brought up. 14 CHAIRMAN HANSON: Right. And Mr. Pesall is 15 representing his father. However, he's indicated some 16 things that I'm going to ask him a question on, and that 17 could lead to the other. 18 COMMISSIONER NELSON: Okay. CHAIRMAN HANSON: There's a Pesall and Podoll. 19 20 Got you. 21 COMMISSIONER FIEGEN: Mr. Chairman, are you 22 willing to hear comments? 23 CHAIRMAN HANSON: Absolutely. 24 COMMISSIONER FIEGEN: Okay. Thank you. 25 CHAIRMAN HANSON: Are there any further

25

1 questions of Mr. Welk or Mr. Ford at this time? 2 Commissioner Fiegen. COMMISSIONER FIEGEN: You know, I have several 3 4 questions. I don't know if we're going to go to comments 5 or if they're on the stand and that's who we're dealing 6 with right now. 7 CHAIRMAN HANSON: You know, we can move these 8 folks back and forth, back and forth, back and forth, to 9 your delight. So whatever you're comfortable with at 10 this point. You 21 know, hard for us to see that line and that it comes 22 through the farm yard and how close is it to the dairy. 23 And we don't know that as Commissioners. 2.4 If you continue to work with the Schuring farm, 25 I probably won't offer a condition. If you choose not

26

1 to, I would look at a condition that looks at, you know, we have the ability to look at serious injury, and 2 3 serious injury also deals with economic conditions and 4 that if there is serious injury to the dairy farm within 5 five years of the transmission line being in operation, 6 that the dairy farm can come in front of the Commission 7 again and present their facts to us. 8 Because I don't know if it's going to affect it 9 or not. And the evidence -- we have had evidence that it 10 can affect dairy, but we don't really know exactly the 11 entire evidence. So that's one item that we can continue 12 to talk about, or I can try to put a condition on our 13 order. 14 Any comments? 15 MR. FORD: I think that -- we want to do what we 16 can to get the permit approved, of course. And if you're 17 saying that -- us committing to a particular route --18 COMMISSIONER FIEGEN: You can't do that? MR. FORD: Yeah. But we are looking at another 19 20 option, and, you know, that's about all I can say right 21 now is that that option is being entertained. 22 COMMISSIONER FIEGEN: Right. And I understand 23 that. 24 We're going to go to the stands next. You have 25 a lot of your acres that are cropland and cultivated

1 cropland. It looks like about 1,500 and -- I don't know. 2 1,592 in the original map. So how do you decide what you're going to test? 3 4 You talk about in your filing or your mitigation that 5 you're going to test the highly probable areas. What does that look like? 6 7 MR. FORD: Are we talking testing for SCN? 8 COMMISSIONER FIEGEN: Yes. I'm sorry. Yes. 9 MR. FORD: Okay. No. We're testing all 10 cultivated fields. 11 COMMISSIONER FIEGEN: Right. All bean fields. 12 How about corn fields that have a rotation of only one 13 year away from beans? 14 MR. FORD: Yes. They will be tested. 15 COMMISSIONER FIEGEN: And so what did we hear in 16 the evidentiary? Is it three years of rotation? So how many years of -- so what if it's corn two years in a row? 17 18 You'll be testing that cropland? MR. FORD: Yes. 19 COMMISSIONER FIEGEN: Okay. 20 21 MR. FORD: We're not going to take that into 22 account as part of the testing. Although, you know, like 23 I said, we're working with Dr. Emmanuel. If he has some 24 different recommendation, I guess I don't know about that 25 at this time.

1 But our intention was to test all cultivated 2 fields because if they've ever had soybeans on them, they 3 have the risk of having the nematode present in the soil. 4 COMMISSIONER FIEGEN: Sure. 5 MR. FORD: So that was our intention was to test 6 all cultivated fields. 7 COMMISSIONER FIEGEN: Thank you, Mr. Ford. 8 Commissioner Nelson went down a path of giving 9 us your plan in the future after you have it more 10 detailed. 20	what procedures or processes that are going to be applied
21	have been modeled after the CapX2020 projects.
22	Being that Otter Tail was heavily involved in
23	the CapX projects, we've been looking hard at their
24	procedures and everything from those projects as to how
25	best to do things.

1 I've also met with some other individuals who were involved in some of the CapX projects to kind of 2 3 find out things that worked and didn't work. At least in 4 an effort to try to make sure that the procedures that 5 we're going to incorporate or apply on this project are, 6 you know, successful, that they are not maybe antiquated 7 or obsolete processes compared to what people have 8 learned today.

9 So, you know, there is every effort made through 10 the process of construction to minimize to the extent 11 possible any damages to the landowners' property. 12 Obviously, though, when you have that number of crews 13 travel up and down the right of way to do the actual, you 14 know, structure erection, wiring stringing, foundation 15 pourers, you know, you're going to have compaction.

And that's why we have in our damage mitigation process the plan to decompact or, you know, scarify or turn over those areas and try to restore that compaction at least to the extent that we can close to the original level.

21 CHAIRMAN HANSON: So you're confident that in 22 your experience that the compaction problem will be taken 23 care of? 24 MR. FORD: I am, yes.

1 assume the State would get from the poles and so on and But some of these are the things that are a 2 so forth. 3 little discouraging to everybody that we talk to is that 4 we're told one thing and then another thing and then 5 another thing, and we don't know where we're at. They're 6 willing to move the line, but yet they're not willing to 7 move the line when we contact them.

8 So I guess just based on all of this, it's just 9 kind of -- it's been kind of a confusing project, and I 10 can't really see and I've never got a direct answer what 11 is South Dakota going to benefit from it, the people in 12 South Dakota?

And as a South Dakota Utility Commission I guess if I was on it, I would have a hard time saying yes because I can't see where anybody in South Dakota is going to benefit from it. And they've admitted that. We're not going to get one little kilowatt of electricity from it.

19 So that's just my comments. So thank you. 20 CHAIRMAN HANSON: Thank you, sir. 21 MR. PODOLL: Can I ask one question? 22 CHAIRMAN HANSON: Please, go ahead. 23 MR. PODOLL: At the meeting I don't know if it 24 was the one at Northern or the other one. It was 25 mentioned that these companies were supposed to contact

Because even these companies got 2 to be in on the planning on what's happening out in the field. 3 4 So thank you. 5 CHAIRMAN HANSON: Thank you. 6 And we'd need to have special information on 7 addresses and things like that if people were not 8 contacted because the parties -- the Applicant has 9 records of where they've sent information. And if 10 they -- it's really up to people too to contact them if 11 they feel they need information. So appreciate you doing 12 that. 13 MR. SMITH: Yeah. And it's important to note 14 too that it isn't people who live within -- it's the 15 owners of property as reflected by the -- yeah. The 16 person who's -- who's authorized to receive the tax 17 notice from the Director of Equalization. That's the 18 list of people who gets the serve. Not necessarily --19 People can reside within a half a mile and won't 20 get a notice because they're not the record owner of the 21 property. There's nothing in our statutes or anything that requires that, no, there isn't. 22 23 CHAIRMAN HANSON: Yes, sir. 24 MR. DENNERT: Bud Dennert, Westport, 25 South Dakota.

1 And really wasn't planning on talking today, but somebody needs to say something. The line is scheduled 2 to go within 60 rods of my buildings. 3 4 CHAIRMAN HANSON: Is it on your property, sir? 5 MR. DENNERT: What was that? 6 CHAIRMAN HANSON: Is it on your property? 7 MR. DENNERT: It is on my property. And then 8 the line turns and goes east, and it goes by two -- two 9 houses that are probably within 20 rods of the line. 10 Lyle's house is probably 60 rods, maybe a little 11 bit more, from the line. His other son's house is 12 probably in that 40 to 60 rods. Then it goes on east 13 from there, no buildings, for two and a half miles, turns 14 south, and goes right in front of Lloyd's buildings. 15 Now we figured up a route that they could use. 16 Everybody was agreeable except two quarters of land. Now 17 you've got the Schonsenbachs [phonetic], myself, Lyle, 18 the fellow that raises dogs -- I don't know him -- Lyle's family. All of them are against it. 19 20 Would it not be better to fight two people than 21 to fight the whole herd of us? 22 You know, we've got kind of a love for that land 23 that these shiny-shoed fellows that run these big 24 companies, they don't understand. They don't realize 25 that the one farm I have my grandfather homesteaded. He

1	put his life into that. My dad put his life into it.
2	And I put quite a bit of mine into it.
3	And to come out and just dig a hole 50 foot deep
4	and start running cement in there and we're giving you
5	a blotch on our land title. That blotch is going to be
6	there forever. There's no way that we can get that off
7	of there or anything else, but it's going to stay there
8	as long as what there as what there's life in this
9	country, I guess.
10	And, you know, those are things I think maybe
11	you should be thinking about. You're thinking about some
12	high fancy things that I'm not understanding what you're
13	talking about, but I do understand my walking on that
14	land, my owning it, my paying taxes on it, and my
15	stewardship of taking care of it, that the land is
16	fertilized properly, that it's sprayed properly, and we
17	don't try to overcrop it. Those are things that I'm
18	concerned about.
19	And I think maybe we should be starting to look
20	at those considerations, look at the shortage we've got
21	of beef. A little area out in western South Dakota loses
22	its cow herd. Look what it's done to the price of beef.
23	What would one crop failure do to the price of corn, the
24	availability of corn? And, you know, maybe we better
25	look at some of those things and take care of them,

1 rather than somebody coming in and saying, hey, we're going to build a line across your land; we're going to 2 give you \$140,000. 3 4 Well, we've been fighting income tax for the last few years. You hand me \$140,000, probably 70,000 of 5 6 that will go back to the Internal Revenue. Now that 7 don't make much sense, does it? But I've got the blotch 8 on my land. 9 I guess there's other things I'd like to talk 10 about, but you guys want to go home too so -- okay. 11 Thank you very much. I appreciate it. 12 CHAIRMAN HANSON: Thank you, sir. Appreciate 13 it, Mr. Dennert. And we're not trying to fight anybody. 14 When you said it's better to fight two of them than all 15 of --16 MR. DENNERT: I wanted to make -- are you having 17 kind of a brown out? It seems like your P.A. system, you 18 aren't getting much volume out of it. I'm having a heck of a time here. 19 CHAIRMAN HANSON: Well, I guess that makes two 20 21 of us then. Thank you. I thought it was me. 22 Thank you. 23 Mr. Pedall -- Pesall. Excuse me. Did I say 24 Pedall all of these times? I'll call you Bob then. How 25 is that?

15	be built, would unduly interfere with their ability and
16	would cause them severe economic harm.
17	There were no farmers or anybody else really
18	qualified to talk about how farming works that came in
19	and testified on behalf of the Applicants. So when I say
20	there was unrefuted testimony that's what I'm referring
21	to.
22	CHAIRMAN HANSON: Okay. Thank you. Are there
23	other questions by the Commissioners of Mr. Pesall?
24	MR. PESALL: I guess since I have the mic. if I
25	can offer just a couple of comments.

1 First of all, I have some legal concern with the 2 prospect of authorizing the Applicants to come up with a plan after the permit is granted. I don't know if that's 3 4 appropriate delegation.

5 So as much as we're on the record, I would raise 6 that objection. I don't think that's the right way to go 7 about it. I think the right way to go about it is to use 8 the Commission's authority to deny on specific grounds 9 and then allow them to reapply.

10 Beyond that, the Commission is looking at what 11 has been done in the past. I try to avoid ever coming 12 out to Pierre without invoking the founding fathers at 13 least once. Thomas Paine was famed for having said long 14 history if not thinking a thing wrong gives it the 15 superficial appearance of being right.

16 I would encourage the Commission to stick with 17 the evidence that we've got this time around and, of 18 course, ask that you deny the permit.

19 CHAIRMAN HANSON: Thank you. 20 Any further questions by the Commission? 21 Hearing none, there will be time for comment. Is there a Motion at this time? 22 23 COMMISSIONER FIEGEN: Do you mind if I just make one quick comment? 24 25

CHAIRMAN HANSON:

Absolutely.

1 COMMISSIONER FIEGEN: First of all, I want to thank the three people that drove up to Pierre today to 2 3 give us comments. It's always good to hear them. 4 When I was a legislator that would have worked 5 perfectly and we could have listened to you and we could 6 have taken your comments and we could have taken the 7 letter that you sent us. 8 But when I became a Public Utilities 9 Commissioner I remember my boss at the time was 10 Judith Meierhenry because I ran a nonprofit. And she was my boss, and she was a Supreme Court Justice. And she 11 12 said to me, Kristie, you are now a quasi-judicial, and 13 now your steps are more judicial than legislative. 14 And so although you sent me this letter and I 15 appreciate your comments, I so wish you would have became 16 parties in the case and that you could have been at the 17 hearing. 18 We try at the Commission to be so open. Our 19 goal is to make sure that the public is absolutely 20 informed and involved. I mean, agriculture is very 21 important to me. 22 I sent a picture to one of our Commissioners on 23 Sunday night that I was throwing 100-pound alfalfa bales 24 and I haven't done that for quite a few years but my 25 brother needed those picked up before it rained so I went

1 and helped him. And I just love agriculture; it's just 2 down in my heart. 3 But, unfortunately, we cannot take the evidence 4 that you gave us today into our consideration of our 5 decision because it's legally wrong. I legally can't do 6 it. Not because there's not merit to what you're saying 7 because there may be. 8 I think all three Commissioners had great 9 concern when we got your letter because of conflicting 10 information. And all the sudden all three of us -- and 11 we don't get to talk so I don't know, but I know them 12 personally that they want to do what's best for the 13 public. 14 And we're like, oh, my goodness. We just got 15 We can't really do a lot about it because it's not this. 16 in the evidentiary hearing. And there's conflicting 17 information and it's late and I so wish you would have 18 became parties in the case. 19 So I just want to thank you for coming up. 20 We're all in a learning process. If this was a 21 legislature, we certainly could have taken your comments. 22 But today it's not. This is a judicial type of process. 23 So thank you. 24 CHAIRMAN HANSON: Please, go ahead. 25 COMMISSIONER NELSON: Commissioner Fiegen, you

did an outstanding job of really summarizing exactly what I've been wrestling with since we got this information, and everything you said is exactly right. And I appreciate your saying that.

1 COMMISSIONER FIEGEN: Mr. Chairman, I don't know how to proceed here. Or Mr. Smith. Like the Stipulation 2 3 and how can we present conditions that other 4 Commissioners can deny or vote for? 5 CHAIRMAN HANSON: Perhaps I can help a little 6 bit with that. 7 COMMISSIONER FIEGEN: Thank you. 8 CHAIRMAN HANSON: On my comments. 9 I think I'm about 80, 90 percent, somewhere in 10 that vicinity in a position of voting in favor of this. 11 However, that 80, 90 percent -- that 10 to 20 percent causes me to reflect on this and want to review it, 12 13 review the -- now that I've actually been able to hear 14 your thoughts from the two of you. 15 And I think that would give us some time for you 16 to prepare -- or for me to prepare, for Commissioner 17 Nelson to prepare any concerns that they have for 18 amendments to conditions or anything of that nature. 19 After all, this is a proposal to us as to 20 whether or not we should accept it. I helped my grandfather plant soybeans 6 for a long time and never thought that I'd be involved 7 with cysts and nematodes and things of that nature. 8 But when I look at the SCN -- and I don't mean 9 to downplay the importance of the process of construction 10 to make certain that contamination is held to as minimal 11 as possible, but when we heard the presentation by the 12 professor, Mr. Tylka, on the soybean cyst nematode and a 13 life cycle being four weeks, a pregnant female having 14 2 to 300 eggs the size of a period, that anything, in his 15 words, can transport SCN, even the wind can transport it, 16 deer and badger and other rodents, rabbits, hunters, 17 neighbor helping in a harvest, birds, it's just -- it's 18 just amazing how this hasn't -- well, it has. 19 I remember reading about it years ago, not that 20 long ago, where it was just in the southeastern part of 21 the United States. And it has spread rapidly. I just 22 don't see how -- how it's -- you know, we've got to do 23 everything we can responsibly to make sure that it's 24 not -- the contamination is not spread unnecessarily, but 25 it seems that this is something that's going to happen

1 everywhere. And I appreciate the challenges of making 2 certain that we keep it down to a minimum. 3 But I still -- my concerns are strongly going to 4 be piercing -- looking at the construction process itself 5 which is part of the SCN. And I'm just not 100 percent 6 there ready to support this. It's not to say that in two 7 weeks I won't be, but I just need to have a little more 8 time to look at that. 9 Perhaps that's the time you need to look at 10 the concerns you have.
