
Attached you will find a fact sheet provided by Black Hills Corporation regarding the corporation's new headquarters planned for Rapid City. It is important to note that the corporation – owned and managed by shareholders – owns Black Hills Power along with several other businesses including utilities in other states as the fact sheet points out. Here is an excerpt: "Eight percent of our customers and 11 percent of our company assets are here in the Black Hills. The other 90-plus percent of customers, including more than 680,000 natural gas and electric utility customers and 89 percent of related assets, are in Colorado, Iowa, Kansas, Montana, Nebraska and Wyoming." In other words the vast majority of BHC's business is located outside of South Dakota and is not regulated by the PUC.

The building of a headquarters by BHC was not an issue or expense in the recent BHP rate case before the commission.

Regardless of whether you or I believe a new headquarters is needed, I hope we both can agree that it is fortunate BHC is keeping those jobs and payroll in South Dakota.

BHC CORPORATE HEADQUARTERS:

FACT SHEET

WHY:

- We've chosen to build a new corporate headquarters in south Rapid City that will bring most of our 500 employees, currently separated in five local locations, under one roof. It'll also give us future expansion options as we continue to grow.
- In addition to long-term savings for our customers, the new facility will provide additional community

- engagement options through a public meeting and event space.
- The future is bright for Black Hills Corp. and Rapid City. We are committed to continuing to grow our company as we've done over the past 10 years and helping to grow the Rapid City community as we've done for more than 130 years.

HOW MUCH?

The approximately \$70 million cost of the facility will replace existing expenses for our five facilities throughout Rapid City and will be spread across all of our regulated utility subsidiaries and non-regulated energy subsidiaries.

We're moving employees from five facilities to one, which is more efficient. Predicting rate cases is challenging, but we expect the efficiencies gained from being in one location to help minimize rate increases.

Our Black Hills Power operations and warehouse employees in Rapid City will continue to work from our BHP Service Center on Deadwood Avenue.

WHERE?

The building will be at the southwest corner of the intersection of Catron Boulevard and U.S. Highway 16.

WHEN?

We plan to break ground this spring and begin moving employees into the building during the first part of 2017.





WHO WE ARE:
