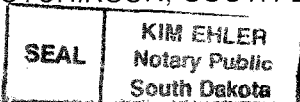

At the hearing, the Applicant will present a brief description of the Project, following which interested persons may appear and present their views, comments and questions regarding the Application. At such formal hearing, all parties will have the opportunity to appear, present evidence, and cross-examine the other parties' witnesses and exercise all other rights afforded by SDCL Chapters 1-26, 49-1, and 49-41B and ARSD Chapters 20:10:01 and 20:10:22, including rights of appeal to the courts. Absent a contested issue, the Commission will schedule the matter for decision at a regular or ad hoc meeting of the Commission.

For approval, the Applicant must show that the proposed Project will comply with all applicable laws and rules, will not pose a threat of serious injury to the environment nor to the social and economic condition of inhabitants or expected inhabitants in the siting area, will not substantially impair the health, safety or welfare of the inhabitants, and will not unduly interfere with the orderly development of the region with due consideration having been given to the views of governing bodies of affected local units of government. Five States Hold Primaries Tuesday

NEW YORK (AP) — A well-financed state senator won the Democratic primary for a Northern Virginia congressional race Tuesday, setting up an all-female November election in one of the nation's most closely watched House districts.

Elsewhere, President Donald Trump has elevated Republican primaries in South Carolina, where a devout ally and a regular critic are running in separate races.

Polls have closed in both states and well as Maine, while voting continues in the two other states holding primaries Tuesday, Nevada and North Dakota. Together, they raise to 21 the number of states having held their 2018 primary elections so far.

Voter-Roll Decision Impact May Be Limited

ATLANTA (AP) — A U.S. Supreme Court ruling has cleared the way for states to take a tougher approach to maintaining their voter rolls, but will likely have a limited impact.

Ohio plans to resume its process for removing inactive voters, which was affirmed in Monday's 5-4 ruling, after the November elections. It takes a particularly aggressive approach that appears to be an outlier among states.

"Our law has been on the books. It hasn't changed, and it isn't changing," said Ohio's Election Board spokesman Bryan Dean.

At issue was when a state begins the process to notify and ultimately remove people from the rolls after failing to respond to notices. In most states with similar laws, like Oklahoma, that process begins after voters miss two or more federal elections.

Puerto Rico Issues New Data On Deaths

SAN JUAN, Puerto Rico (AP) — Eight days after Hurricane Maria devastated Puerto Rico, Elnair Perez felt a pain in his chest.

Doctors near his small town sent him to Puerto Rico's main hospital for emergency surgery for an aortic aneurysm. But when the ambulance pulled into the parking lot in the capital, San Juan, after a more than two-hour drive, a doctor ran out to stop it.

"He said, 'Don't bring him in here, I can't care for him. I don't have power, I don't have water. I don't have an anesthesiologist,'" Perez's daughter, Nerybelle, recalled.

The 95-year-old Perez died as the ambulance drove him back to southwestern Puerto Rico but he is not included in the island's official hurricane death toll of 64 people, a figure at the center of a growing legal and political fight over the response to the Category 4 storm that hit Puerto Rico on Sept. 20, 2017.

Facing at least three lawsuits demanding more data on the death toll, Puerto Rico's government released new information on Tuesday that added detail to the growing consensus that hundreds or even thousands of people died as an indirect result of the storm.

Seattle Divided As Leaders Halt Tax

SEATTLE (AP) — Seattle leaders on Tuesday repealed a tax on large companies such as Amazon and Starbucks after a backlash from businesses, a stark reversal from a month ago when the City Council unanimously approved the effort to combat a growing homelessness crisis.

A divided crowd chanted, jeered and booed at the council meeting, drawing out the leaders as they cast a 7-2 vote. People shouted, "Stop the repeal," as others unfurled a large red banner that read, "Tax Amazon." An opposing group held "No tax on jobs" signs.

The vote showed Amazon's ability to aggressively push back on government taxes, especially in its affluent hometown where it's the largest employer with more than 45,000 workers and where some have criticized it for helping cultivate a widening income gap that is pricing lower-income employees out of housing.

The tax was proposed as a progressive revenue source aimed at tackling one of the nation's highest homelessness numbers, a problem that hasn't eased even as city spending grew.

Business and residents demanded more accountability on how Seattle funds homelessness and housing and said the city should take a regional approach to the problem. Many worried that Amazon and others would leave the city as the companies sharply criticized the tax.

Lawsuit: Dept. Failed To Inform McCabe

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Justice Department has repeatedly refused to provide former FBI Deputy Director Andrew McCabe with documents related to his firing, according to a lawsuit filed on his behalf Tuesday.

The complaint says the Justice Department has publicly defended the firing yet failed to identify for McCabe the policies and procedures it followed before dismissing him. The department has withheld the information, McCabe's lawyers allege, for fear that the materials could be used against them in any additional lawsuits.

"We don't create or adjudicate under secret law or procedure," David Snyder, one of McCabe's lawyers, said in an email to The Associated Press.

The case pits the career law enforcement official against a Justice Department that employed him for more than two decades. It reopens attention on a firing last March that divided current and former Justice Department officials. And it signals that McCabe, repeatedly targeted for criticism and attacks by President Donald Trump in the last year, is determined to try to clear his name in court even if he faces a possible criminal probe into whether he intentionally misled internal investigators.

Bush Sr. Becomes Oldest Ex-President

KENNEBUNKPORT, Maine (AP) — George H.W. Bush enjoyed a relaxing birthday on Tuesday as he became the first former U.S. president to turn 94.

The nation's 41st president was receiving calls and taking it easy at his seaside home eight days after being released from a hospital where he was treated for low blood pressure, said Chief of Staff Sean Spicer.

Bush's office shared a letter from the president in which he said, "My heart is full on the first day of my 94th year."

"As many of you know, for years I have said the three most important things in life are faith, family and friends. My faith has never been stronger," the former president wrote in the letter.

Federal Judge Approves AT&T-Time Warner Merger

WASHINGTON — A federal judge Tuesday cleared the way for AT&T Inc.'s \$85.4-billion purchase of Time Warner Inc., creating an entertainment colossus that promises to reshape the media business.

U.S. District Judge Richard Leon's ruling in the biggest antitrust case of the century is expected to pave the way for more mega-mergers and was a stinging defeat to the Trump administration.

Before a packed courtroom, Leon made it clear that the government had failed to prove any of its arguments against the merger during the six-week trial.

"The parties have waged an epic battle," Leon said. "The court has spoken."

AT&T is expected to quickly finalize its deal to buy Time Warner.

"We are pleased that, after conducting a full and fair trial on the merits, the court has categorically rejected the government's lawsuit to block our merger with Time Warner," AT&T general counsel David McAtee said in a statement. "We thank the court for its thorough and timely examination of the evidence... and we look forward to closing the merger on or before June 20 so we can begin to give consumers video entertainment that is more affordable, mobile and innovative."

The judge strongly urged prosecutors to bypass any appeal, saying it would be "unjust, out of line and cause many delays." After the court hearing, Assistant U.S. Atty. Gen. Makan Delrahim said he was "obviously disappointed" by the decision and that he and his team would review the judge's 170-page decision.

"I've taken an oath to uphold competition and we're going to take a review of the opinion and take the next steps as necessary," Delrahim said as he left the federal courthouse near Capitol Hill.

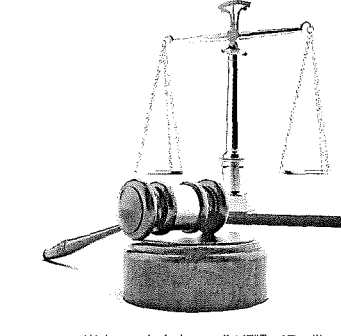
Wall Street welcomed the decision, which boosted the shares of other media companies. Time Warner Inc. closed at \$92.48 and jumped 5 percent in after-hours trading, although shares in AT&T, which closed at \$34.35 Tuesday, dropped 1.5 percent.

President Trump had said during the 2016 campaign that the merger would concentrate too much media power in one company, and his long-running feud with Time Warner's CNN cast a political shadow over the case. The Justice Department filed an antitrust suit late last year to block the deal and Leon denied AT&T's request to try to uncover any evidence that the White House might have influenced the decision.

AT&T, already a telecommunications giant with more than 100 million wireless subscribers and 25 million pay TV homes, will acquire Time Warner's valuable entertainment assets, including HBO, CNN, Cartoon Network, TBS, TNT, Turner Classic Movies and Warner Bros. Hollywood's largest TV and movie studio.

During the trial, Justice Department lawyers argued that AT&T wanted to "weaponize" Time Warner's content to give it leverage to raise customer prices.

The result, the government warned, would be significant harm to competition — particularly new online pay TV providers — and a powerful new gatekeeper company that would lead to an increase of more than \$400 million a year in prices for all Americans.



But AT&T and Time Warner Inc.'s legal team, led by high-powered Los Angeles attorney Daniel Petroselli, pursued an aggressive defense that included testimony from AT&T Chief Executive Randall Stephenson and Time Warner CEO Jeffrey Bewkes.

"The case stands as a testament to the wisdom to the combination of these two great companies and how it will benefit consumers for generations to come," Petroselli said. "We're disappointed that it took 18 months to get here but are relieved that it's finally behind us."

Bewkes and Stephenson had argued that the merger was needed so the companies could better battle online competitors such as Netflix, Amazon, Facebook and Google. The combination of Time Warner's "premium content" with AT&T's vast subscriber network would allow the new company to engage consumers and target advertising tailored to their habits.

Prices would go down, not up, AT&T said.

AMA Adopts Policies To Cut Gun Violence

CHICAGO — With frustration mounting over lawmakers' inaction on gun control, the American Medical Association on Tuesday pressed for a ban on assault weapons and came out against arming teachers as a way to fight what it calls a public health crisis.

At its annual policymaking meeting, the nation's largest physicians group bowed to unprecedented demands from doctor members to take a stronger stand on gun violence — a problem the organization says is as menacing as a lethal infectious disease.

The action comes against a backdrop of recurrent school shootings, everyday street violence in the nation's inner cities, and rising U.S. suicide rates.

"We as physicians are the witnesses to the human toll of this disease," Dr. Megan Ranney, an emergency-medicine specialist at Brown University, said at the meeting.

AMA delegates voted to adopt several of nearly a dozen gun-related proposals presented by doctor groups that are part of the AMA's membership. They agreed to:

- Support any bans on the purchase or possession of guns and ammunition by people under 21.
- Back laws that would require licensing and safety training for gun owners and registration of all firearms.
- Press for legislation that would allow relatives of suicidal people or those who have threatened imminent violence to seek court-ordered removal of guns from the home.
- Encourage better training for physicians in how to recognize patients at risk for suicide.

Push to eliminate loopholes in laws preventing the purchase or possession of guns by people found guilty of domestic violence, including expanding such measures to cover convicted stalkers.

Gun violence is not a new issue for the AMA; it has supported past efforts to ban assault weapons; declared gun violence a public health crisis; backed background checks, waiting periods and better funding for mental health services; and pressed for more research on gun violence prevention.

But Dr. David Barbe, whose one-year term as AMA president ended Tuesday, called the number of related measures on the table "an extraordinary and said recent violence, including the Parkland, Florida, school shooting and the Las Vegas massacre, "spurred a new sense of urgency ... while Congress fails to act."

But support for banning assault weapons was overwhelming, with the measure adopted by a 465-89 vote.

"There's a place to start and this should be it," Dr. Jim Hiasdale, a San Jose, California, trauma surgeon, said before the vote.

Gun violence is not a new issue for the AMA; it has supported past efforts to ban assault weapons; declared gun violence a public health crisis; backed background checks, waiting periods and better funding for mental health services; and pressed for more research on gun violence prevention.





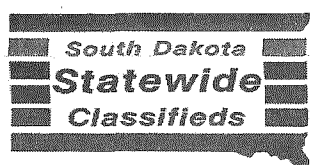
