Dustin,

I wish to comment on the proposed rate hike by B.H. Power & Light. First, I believe that the proposal is an excessive rate increase for residential and other classes. I see where they listed that they anticipate higher Kwh sales for the next calendar year. With increase sales, you would think that increasing customer rates would not have to be in the 20 some percent. By the way, is it normal for utility companies to keep on revising their proposals to the PUC as did B.H. Power & Light?

Is it possible to authorize an increase of approximately 10% across the board, for six months, (if their facts prove that they need an increase) and then look at their sales, gross profit and net profit in six months, and then again, make a decision after that? It seems like that would be more reasonable, and fair, to both consumers and to B.H. Power & Light.

I know that there is much more information that you look at. But I am still concerned about giving an order to allow the power company to increase rates by 25 or 26 or 28 percent.
