PROCEEDINGS
STEVEN RHODY,
EXing first duly sworn, testified as follows:
EXAMINATION
By MR. ALMOND:
Q. Can you state your name and spell your name for
the court reporter, please.
A. Steven Rhody. S-T-E-V-E-N. R-H-O-D-Y.
Q. And, Mr. Rhody, just a few ground rules here.
Let's try not to talk over one another, because it's
really hard for her to take down two people talking at
the same time; and if you can answer all my questions
verbally as opposed to with head nods or uh-huhs (Yeses)
or huh-uhs (Nos).
A. Yeah.
Q. Because it's really hard for the court reporter
to take down those types of things. We're probably
going to break those rules, but let's just try our best
not to. Okay?
Let's start with the names of your parents,
first and last.
A. Arlen and Barbara.
Q. Rhody?
A. Rhody.
Q. What about siblings of yours'

A. Jody.
Q. Jody. Okay. Children. Do you have any children?
A. My children are Robert and Kate.
Q. Is Kate married?
A. Yep.
Q. And what is her last name?
A. Rhody.
Q. Other board members' family members. Do you know James and Jerome DeBoer?
A. I know them, yeah.
Q. Do you know that their Mike DeBoer's brothers?
A. Mike DeBoer?
Q. I'm sorry. Kevin DeBoer's brothers.
A. Yeah, I think I knew they were brothers.
Q. Do you know Justin and Kristen Brandt?
A. Huh-uh (No).
Q. No?
A. No.
Q. What about a Diane and Joel Brandt?
A. Yeah, I know them.
Q. And I believe Joel is Paul Brandt's brother; correct?
A. I believe so. ,

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A. I think they're twins, yeah.
Q. What do you do for a living?
A. I have cattle and I put up hay. And then I
have a window washing service on the side.
Q. And Dennis Kanengieter, your co-board-member, do you know what he does for a living?
A. I think he works for Clark Rogness and works on his trucks or something. And then I think he helps him farm when he needs it.
Q. Do you know Clark Rogness?
A. Yes, I do.
Q. Do you know Phillip Rogness?
A. Yes.
Q. How long has Dennis been working for the Rognesses?
A. Oh, I don't know.
Q. Has it been quite a awhile?
A. Yeah, I think it's been quite a while.
Q. All right. Mr. Rhody, what l'd like you to
tell me is tell me any and all agreements that you've
made or entered into with any wind company, if there are any.
A. There is none.

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A. Yeah, I suppose.
Q. In your role as a board member, have you ever recused yourself or abstained from voting on any issue related to wind?
A. No.
Q. Have you ever recused yourself or abstained from voting on any issue?
A. No.
Q. How long have you been a board member?
A. January of 2017.
Q. And how did you get on the Board?
A. Well, I got on the Board because Gary Jaeger didn't want to be on there anymore and they needed a commissioner, so I -- it was my turn that I had to do it. (Chuckles.)
Q. Did Gary ask you to do it?
A. Yeah.
Q. And when did Gary ask you to be on the Board?
A. I'm sorry. Did you say when or --
Q. When.
A. When. Well, it was probably when he decided he was going to get off like December or something.
Q. December of 2016?
A. I suppose.
Q. Then are you also on the county commission?
A. Yes.
Q. And did you join the county commission the same time?
A. Nope. I was on there, oh, 2012? Let's see.

Yeah, it might have been.
Q. Around 2012?
A. Yeah, I think so. Is that that election year? I think so.
Q. Do the Deuel County ordinances require a person
on the county commission, at least one person also sit
on the Board of Adjustment?
A. Yeah. I'm sorry. Yes.
Q. So Gary basically said I'm sick of doing that dual service role and it's basically your turn?
A. He had been on there a long time.
Q. How do the county commissioners decide who is 3 going to fill that role on the Board?
A. Well, we all have a certain amount of duties. And we just decide amongst each other who wants to do

Q. Okay. In your time that you've been on the Board -- When I said the Board, I'm referring to the zoning board and the Board of Adjustment. Do you understand that?
A. Yes.
Q. And if I'm going to refer to your services as a county commissioner, l'll be sure to talk about the county commission. Okay?
A. Okay.
Q. In your time as serving on the Board, have any of your board members ever recused himself or refrained from voting on any wind issues?
A. I don't think so. You mean, before that January 22 meeting?
Q. At any time.
A. Well, I don't recall. I don't think so.
Q. We've heard a little bit about Paul Brandt, I believe, recusing himself last night; correct?
A. Correct, yes.
Q. Aside from that, do you recall any other time when a board member who's recused himself?
A. Maybe one time in that when we were meeting in the 4 H Service Center. George, was there, weren't you? Didn't somebody recuse themself there?

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Q. Were you guys concerning a wind project at all?
A. Yeah, I thought it was.
Q. What wind project?
A. And I don't think I was on the Board then.
Q. And what was the wind project?
A. Was that the Flying Cow?
Q. Were you at the board meeting, or how do you
know that -- why do you think somebody was --
A. I was just at the board meeting. Do you remember, George?
Q. Okay.
A. I thought somebody --

MR. PETERSON: You can't ask other people in the room.
A. Oh, okay. I don't remember anything.
Q. So tell me about last night. Why did

Paul Brandt recuse himself last night?
A. Oh, I think he said he had a meteor -- he was going to have a meteorological tower or he did have one.
Q. And last night was the Crowned Ridge project; correct?
A. Yeah.
Q. Mr. Rhody, when did you first become aware or familiar, when did you first hear about Invenergy?
A. Yeah, that's been a while ago. Oh, when they

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A. Right.
Q. So because you were never invited, did you ever go to any of them?
A. I think some of them were in the paper maybe.
Q. Okay.
A. But I neglected to see that and I didn't go to
them, so. I was busy.
Q. You never attended any events?
A. No, I never went to any of them.
Q. We got off topic. Crowned Ridge project. So

Mr. Brandt recused himself last night because he had a -- What kind of tower did you say?
A. He called it a meteorological tower.
Q. And did the board members discuss his recusal at all?
A. No. Well, I didn't. But it's just a fact of matter, you know, he said that and I pretty much just walked out of the room after that.
Q. So did he show up to the meeting or -- How did he recuse himself? Did he recuse himself, or did someone recuse him? I guess I'm trying to figure out more of the details.
A. I think he recused himself.
Q. Did he still attend the meeting?
A. He did -- You mean last night?
Q. Yes.
A. He did part of the meeting last night with those other things that we had to do, and then when it got to be 7:00, why, then, Gary DeJong took over.
Q. Okay. And the meeting last night, tell me about what was the project for?
A. Yes.
Q. What about application sizes? How did the
A. What was the project for?
Q. The Crowned Ridge, what is that?
A. Well, they're having wind towers from

Codington, Grant, and Deuel.
Q. So it's a wind energy system?
A. Wind energy system.
Q. Similar to the Invenergy application?
A. Yeah, I think so. It was very similar.
Q. Were public comments submitted in the Crowned Ridge proceeding?
A. Were public comments submitted to me?
Q. Yeah, did people from the public submit comments to the board before and during the hearing?
A. Ah, yeah, we -- I know Jodi got a letter and wanted it read last night. And then I had a copy of it. And there might have been one other one, one other letter that Jodi got and forwarded it to me for me to read.
Q. And similar public comments were submitted in 20 the Invenergy project; correct?
A. You mean last night?
Q. No. We just talked about the public comments. There were public comments submitted for last night's project.
A. Yeah.
Q. I'm talking about the Invenergy project, the public also submitted comments for that project as well; correct?
A. You mean, since it's started?
Q. No. If you go back to the hearing that took place in January for the Invenergy project --
A. Yeah.
Q. -- the public submitted comments before that hearing and during the hearing. Right?
A. Oh, yes. That's right.
Q. Just like the public submitted comments for the Crowned Ridge project before and during the Crowned Ridge hearing?
A. And in the Invenergy one there was a lot more activity, I guess.
Q. So there was a lot --
A. A lot of e-mails.
Q. A lot more public comments in the Invenergy application versus the Crowned Ridge application?
A. Yes. Definitely.
Q. Was there a lot more written material submitted in the Invenergy proceeding than in the Crowned Ridge proceeding?

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A. No.
Q. In front of you in these four binders is what has been marked as Exhibit 2. And they are Exhibit B to the return that was produced in this proceeding. What they are is the two applications that were submitted by Invenergy for their special exception permits. Are you with me?
A. That's what they submitted for their special exception permit?
Q. That's my understanding. Do you remember Invenergy submitting applications?
A. Uh-huh (Yes).
Q. For a special exception permit, or for two special exception permits?
A. Uh-huh (Yes).
Q. Yes?
A. Yes.
Q. And because there were two projects; right?
A. Yeah. There was a "North" and a "South."
Q. And they submitted a separate application for each project?
A. The Deuel Harvest North and a Deuel Harvest South, correct. Yep.
Q. And I have the application separated here into the "North" project and the "South" project. Did you
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get the applications before the hearing?
A. Yes.
Q. Do you recall when you received the applications?
A. Not exactly, but I think it was probably like
two, three weeks before.
Q. And how did you --
A. Maybe a month before.
Q. And how did you get the applications?
A. Jodi gave me a book.
Q. It was a hard copy version?
A. Uh-huh (Yes).
Q. Yes?
A. Yes.
Q. Did you read through both applications?
A. Yes.
Q. Did you read the applications in their entirety?
A. Well, I scanned the entirety, and I've read quite a bit of it.
Q. I'm going to show you page 200 of Exhibit 2 here. Do you remember seeing Appendix F, Copies of Memorandum of Easements with landowners?
A. Nope.
Q. You don't remember seeing that?
A. Nope, but let me look at it.
Q. Yep. Feel free to. Then turn to the next page, on page 201, there is a list of those people who have entered into Memorandum of Easements. Did you go through this list?
A. I didn't go through the list, no.
Q. You didn't go through the list.
A. Huh-uh (No).
Q. Were you aware, did you have any knowledge of who signed up with Invenergy before the hearing?
A. No. Huh-uh (No).
Q. You didn't know, did you know of anyone who had signed up with Invenergy before the hearing?
A. I'm from Toronto and these were mostly up here so I didn't talk to a lot of people. I might have known one or two people.
Q. Who were they?
A. I don't remember. Do you want me to look through the list?
Q. Well, no, I was just hoping you could tell me
off the top of your head, but I don't need you to look
through the whole list. Did you know that
Kevin DeBoer's brothers, James and Jerome were signed up?
A. No, I didn't know that.
Q. What about a Justin and a Kristen Brandt? Did you know that they were signed up?
A. I don't know them, no.
Q. Were you aware that Kevin DeBoer had previously signed up with Invenergy?
A. No.
Q. What about Mike Dahl? Were you aware that Mike Dahl had previously signed an agreement with Invenergy?
A. I might have wondered about if he did or not. But I wasn't going to be nosey and ask him if he did or not. It wasn't my place to ask him.
Q. What about the Rognesses? Any knowledge about whether any of those people had signed up for wind leases?
A. I didn't want to ask that question because it wasn't none of my business.
Q. Tell me about -- What about any of your county commissioners? Did you have any knowledge about any of them signing up with Invenergy?
A. Let's see. There was Gary. He has, is a landowner, and I don't know if he did. And I was wondering if did he, but I wasn't going to ask him that question either.
Q. Gary. What's Gary's last name?

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A. Jaeger.
Q. Jaeger?
A. Yeah. I just assumed he would.
Q. What about Lynn Pederson?
A. Lynn, I did ask him. We were talking about that with him one day, and he had, what was it?
Grassland easement. And he was complaining that he didn't think he could be a part of that because he had that, but I'm not sure that's right. Because I - Can't some of these guys with grassland easements sign up? Anyhow, that's what he was talking about one day.
Q. Did Lynn Pederson ever tell you whether or not he signed up?
A. He said he wasn't.
Q. Okay. When did that conversation take place?
A. Oh, yeah. It was long before Invenergy.
That's been quite a while ago.
Q. Did Invenergy ever come to any county commission meetings?
A. Yes.
Q. And when did they first start coming to county commission meetings?
A. Yeah, let's see. That's a good question. You
24 know, it's been like six months before or maybe it was
25 even a year before they moved forward on it.
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## Q. A year before when?

A. Before January of last year.
Q. January of this year, January of 2018?
A. Or of this year, yeah. So it probably would
have been, you know - l'm guessing here. I can't
remember, but I know they were there long before they (Nods affirmatively.)
Q. Why were they coming to the county commission meetings?
A. Just to make us aware of what they were doing.
Q. Did they ask for anything from the county commission?
A. Nope. Not at that time.
Q. At some point they did?
A. Just an information meeting.
Q. At some point they did ask for something from the county commission or --
A. I don't -- Well, not from the commission they didn't ask anything from us. Maybe some maps from equalization office or something.
Q. Okay. Mark this please. Do you know a

Dan Litchfield?
A. Yes.
(DEPOSITION EXHIBIT 19 MARKED.)
Q. How long have you known Dan Litchfield?
A. Yeah, when he came to the meetings.
Q. So you first met Mr. Litchfield through

Invenergy?
A. Uh-huh (Yes).
Q. Yes?
A. Yes.
Q. I'm handing you what's been marked as

Exhibit 19. This document was produced by Invenergy, and to me it looks like kind of a calendar notification and it says, Call Steve Rhody. It's dated March 21 of 2017, and the organizer was Dan Litchfield. Do you remember having a telephone conversation with Dan Litchfield back in March of 2017?
A. Yes.
Q. Tell me about that conversation.
A. He wanted to come -- or he wanted me to come to the office and have him -- he wanted to show me the maps of his project. And I said, No, why don't you just -because DeAnne Dumke, she's a commissioner, too, and she wanted to see maps too. And so he asked to meet with both of us, and I said, no, just come out to the house and we'll just have DeAnne and we'll both do it at the same time.
Q. Did you guys talk about anything else during that conversation?
A. No. That was it that I remember.
Q. So then did Mr. Litchfield come out to your house then?
A. Yeah.
Q. And DeAnne join you guys?
A. Yep.
Q. And tell me about what happened there.
A. He laid out his maps out on my counter, because I had a nice big counter there and he can lay them out and we looked at them. And he was explaining his setback areas. And he wanted, you know, different sizes setbacks and how that would affect the project.
Q. Approximately when did this take place? When did he come out to your house?
A. Well, I'm thinking probably right around when this was.
Q. A couple days after this phone call?
A. Yeah, probably -- Yeah, that could be. That could be about the time he was there.
Q. When you guys were talking about setbacks, were you talking about actual distances of setbacks?
A. Yes.
Q. Was he advocating for one distance versus another?
A. Yeah, he wanted the original setbacks. And he

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was explaining why he could get a lot more towers in
with a, you know, the smaller setbacks.
Q. And at this point in time, had the ordinances been changed?
A. No.
Q. At this point in time was the county considering changing their ordinances?
A. Yes. I believe so. I think we were thinking about if we needed to change them, as far as I remember now. Sometimes I get the time, you know, confused, but I think that was when we were considering how big to make the setbacks.
Q. And at that meeting did you form any sort of opinion or conclusion about what setbacks were good in your opinion?
A. Not at the meeting. It was after the meeting.
Q. So he didn't persuade you when he came out there?
A. Tried to persuade us, yeah, at this job.
Q. And at some point you ultimately decided to make a conclusion about his proposed setbacks, whether or not you agreed with his position or you thought different setbacks were appropriate?
A. We disagreed with his opinion of the small setbacks and his opinion of the large setbacks, so.
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Yeah. That was -- You know, DeAnne and all the other commissioners we all decided not to go with that.
Q. Aside from that meeting with Dan Litchfield, did you have any other meetings or discussions with anyone from Invenergy related to the zoning ordinances or setbacks?
A. Oh, I know there are other Invenergy people; right? There is other ones besides Dan? And I probably met them but I forgot their name. But, no, I really can't remember any single discussion, other than Dan. That's about the only one I ever talked to.
Q. Michael Svedeman? Did you ever have any conversations with him?
A. I might have, but I can't remember his name, but, no, I don't know him.
Q. Do you recognize the gentleman at the end of the table here?
A. Oh, yeah.

MR. SVEDEMAN: That's me.
A. That's Michael? Okay, yeah.
Q. Did you have any conversations or meetings with
him to talk about setbacks, zoning ordinances, or anything with respect to the project?
A. A personal meeting with him?
Q. Yes.
A. I don't recall one. No.
Q. I'm showing you what has been marked as

Exhibit 5. Looking at page 26, there is an e-mail from
Todd Kays to Jodi, the zoning officer. Do you see that?
A. Uh-huh (Yes).
Q. Did you receive that e-mail at any point in time?
A. I don't remember this, but I know they were involved in it, yeah.
Q. And that e-mail references a Staff Report and
A. I don't think I have. I think I talked to him at other meetings, but that's probably all I talked to him about.
Q. Right now I'm asking about meetings outside of either a commission meeting or a board meeting. Like you had a meeting --
A. I know he was calling. You know, I was busy. I guess I didn't see the reason to meet with him. I know he wanted to talk some more but I never did, I don't think.
Q. What about anyone else from Invenergy?
A. No. No one else.
Q. And did you have any other meetings with
some questions from the chair, Findings of Fact, letter of assurance in Exhibit A. Did you ever get any copies of any of those documents before the January 22 hearing?
A. Other documents than this?
Q. No, the documents that are referenced in this e-mail. Did you receive any of those before the January 22 hearing? And those documents are actually behind that e-mail, so if you want to look through them to try to refresh your memory, you're more than welcome to.
A. Yeah, we were really pushed for time there, and I don't remember any of these, but I probably got them.
Q. When you say you were pushed for time, what do you mean?
A. Oh, I think I had a lot of window washing to do and a lot of things here, and if it wasn't -- When do you think these were sent to me?
Q. I don't know if they were. That's what I'm trying to figure out.
A. Uh-huh (Yes).
Q. Do you remember receiving a Staff Report for the Invenergy project?
A. I don't remember it.
Q. Here on page 27, it says staff report here and it's dated June 22, 2018. You don't remember receiving
that?
A. I may have. I don't remember, though. I see so many things.
Q. Going back, you said about being pressed for time. I just want to find out more what you meant by that.
A. I don't know. It just seems like this window washing keeps me so busy, and then I've got to go to these meetings and that was a busy, busy time.
Q. So if you got this, you might not have reviewed it?
A. I might not have reviewed it entirely.
Q. No. Other things that were sent to you by Jodi, you might not have reviewed. Is that fair?
A. That's fair. Yeah, that's fair.
Q. Okay.
A. And with all the other letters and e-mails. I'd get -- Sometimes I'd have 300 e-mails on my computer and I'd have to clean them off.
Q. Did anyone from Invenergy ever e-mail you?
A. Oh, yes. I'm sure they did.
Q. Have you went back and looked in your e-mail to try to locate any e-mails from people from Invenergy?
A. No.

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Q. I'm going to ask you that you do that after

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A. How do I do that? In my e-mail? They're all trash.
Q. Oh, you deleted all your e-mails?
A. Oh, yeah. I get rid of them right away.
Q. So you're the type of person that deletes
e-mails as soon as they've read them?
A. Right.
Q. Do you have any ability to retrieve them? Are they in the trash folder?
A. They're trash, and then I deleted all my trash, so, because I get so full. Why do you want them? Those were from -- Just nothing. It was what everybody else got. It was the same e-mails that everybody else got. Then we'd talk about them at the meetings, but.
Q. First, what are your e-mail addresses that you use?
A. Steve.Rhody@yahoo.
Q. Do you use any other e-mail addresses?
A. No.
Q. So you have a Yahoo e-mail account?
A. Yes.
Q. How regularly do you empty out trash or clear out the trash?
A. Oh, I've got to do that every couple weeks.

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It's so full. Yeah. I can't -- Anything new coming in it gets lost in there. And I'm not an e-mail guy. If you want to get ahold of me, you call me on the phone. End of story. That's it. I'm old school. I'm not e-mail. I'll text. Pretty much everybody who knows me knows that.
Q. Going back to First District, did they provide any sort of assistance or guidance to the Board for the Invenergy project?
A. Yes. They did.
Q. And I've heard from other board members that they assisted with the Findings of Fact after the hearing.
A. Yes.
Q. What l'm curious about, did they insist in any way before the hearing?
A. I don't recall that they assisted anything before. Todd might have came to a meeting one time and just told us how we should run our meeting. You know, he's been through that and we hadn't been. And he was just giving us some pointers and procedural things. He didn't tell us anything on how to vote. He just -- No, he never would have done that.
Q. And the meeting that -- You said Todd Kays?
A. Yes.
Q. -- may have came too, would that have been the board meeting that took place before the January 22 hearing, if it did take place?
A. Yeah. Uh-huh (Yes).
Q. So if we were to go look in the minutes of that board meeting, if he spoke at that meeting, then the minutes would likely reflect that?
A. Yeah.
Q. And if the minutes don't reflect that and they don't mention Todd Kays at all, would it be fair to assume that he wasn't there?
A. Well, he was there. I remember him being there.
Q. He was there for the meeting before the January 22 hearing?
A. Yeah, like a month or two before I thought.
Q. Was Todd Kays at the January 22 hearing?
A. I think he was, wasn't he? If I remember correctly. He may not have been, but I thought he would like to be.
Q. I'm going to show you what has been marked as Exhibit 4. I'll represent to you that Exhibit 4 is an assortment of documents, many of which are the public comments that were submitted to the Board either before the hearing or, perhaps, during the hearing. I think
there were some that were submitted after the hearing in here. So I just want to talk generally about how you received public comments for the Invenergy project. Did you receive -- You tell me how. Before the hearing, how did you receive public comments?
A. A lot of e-mails and letters.
Q. And when you say "e-mails," who were the e-mails from?
A. Oh, they were from neighbors, and they were from mostly people up in Clear Lake.
Q. Were they sending e-mails directly to you, or were they sending them to Jodi and then she forwarded them to you?
A. A lot of them were to Jody and then to me.
Q. Did anyone from Invenergy e-mail you before the hearing?
A. Before the hearing, I don't think so.
Q. Looking back at Exhibit 4, there is an e-mail here from Joe Blastick. Do you see that?
A. Yeah.
Q. Do you know who Joe Blastick is?
A. No, I don't recall who he is.
Q. If you read the e-mail there, it basically says, Jodi, I'm attaching a bunch of documents that I would like to be submitted as public comments,

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essentially. Do you see that?
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A. Yeah. Uh-huh (Yes).
Q. And then after this e-mail are the documents that are attached to the e-mail.
A. Okay.
Q. Do you recall if this e-mail was forwarded to you?
A. Yeah, like I say, there was so many of them. I would just have time to scan them and that's all I could do.
Q. And what about this letter here?
A. I've seen a lot of letters like that.
Q. Any recollection of actually receiving this letter?
A. That's from Blastick too?
Q. That's my understanding, yes. His signature is here.
A. You see, that's what I do, is I scan them and see if they're opposed or not and then see why. I try to read them all.
Q. Do you recall getting this letter from

Mr. Blastick?
A. I recall getting letters like that. I don't remember Blastick.
Q. Okay.documents of public comments at the hearing already when
you showed up?
A. Yeah, there was a whole stack on the table underneath the paper.
Q. Did you look through those at the hearing?
A. You ain't got time to do that at the hearing.
Q. As I understand it, during the hearing some members of the public provided written comments and

## during the hearing?

A. Right.
Q. They'd say their piece and then they'd give
written documents to the Board. Do you remember that taking place?
A. Yeah.
Q. Did you have time to read those documents before?
A. And I thought that was ridiculous because you're sitting there trying to do your work, and they're giving you documents to read. You ain't got time to read the documents that night. You can scan them but that's all you can do.
Q. Okay. Then at the end of the January 22 hearing, the Board voted to approve the permit; correct?
A. Say that again.
Q. At the end of the January 22 hearing, the Board voted to approve the permits?
A. Yeah. Yes.
Q. Did you have any discussions with any of the other board members before the January 22 hearing about the Invenergy applications outside of a board meeting?
A. Nope.
Q. I want to talk a little bit about the process
that was used at the hearing. Do you recall there being
a three-minute time limit for people in the public to speak?
A. There was a three-minute time limit, yeah.
Q. Was there a three-minute time limit last night for the Crowned Ridge application?
A. Yes.
Q. So back to the Invenergy hearing. Do you know
whose idea it was to impose that three-minute time limit?
A. Kind of my idea. But I don't know if I can take full credit for that, because then Gary Jaeger he come up and he says, you know, we've got to have a limited time to speak, because there is going to be a lot of people to speak and we're not going to be to get -- hear everybody. So then we were thinking about it, and then I think Todd Kays came to that meeting, and we were talking about that and he thought three minutes would be right.
Q. And what meeting are we talking about right now?
A. The commissioner meeting.
Q. The commissioner meeting.
A. Prior, right.
Q. I'm talking about the Board of Adjustment meeting.
meeting that was considering the ordinance changes?
A. Yes, I think so. Yeah, when did we do that? Was that in 2016? I think that's how it went, that that's when we first used that. You know, that might have been where Todd was before, maybe Todd came in front of the commissioners before the ordinance one. I might have had my - I really can't remember. But I think that's maybe when Todd came.
Q. Are you aware of any other projects that are trying to be developed in Deuel County?
A. Well, yeah, Jesse Bermel down here at the Avangrid. Avangrid. A-V-I-N grid, I think. He was going to put up some meteorological towers around and study the wind.
Q. Where at in the process is that project, if you know?
A. That's where it is. It's meteorological towers
and studying wind flows and stuff. And I think they're
probably running around trying to find some leases.
That's what I think, but.
Q. Has anyone ever approached you about signing a lease?
A. I don't have any land to put anything on.
Q. You live here in town?
A. No. I live west of Toronto on an acreage. I
A. No, this is prior to the, the commissioner
meeting prior to, when we were going to - We were trying to set some ground rules for the meeting.
Q. The commissioner meeting. What was that? What were you guys considering?
A. Oh, wait a minute. I got my wires crossed. That was for the ordinance, ordinance meeting. No, for the Invenergy meeting, that had already been done and it worked very well. So we did it the same way. That's what we did there. I've got to back up.
Q. So let's go to the first meeting.
A. The Invenergy meeting?
Q. The first meeting where this three-minute limit came to being.
A. Where that started, that was for the ordinance.
Q. And what body? Was it the county commission or the Board of Adjustment?
A. That was the county commission.
Q. It was a county commission meeting?
A. Uh-huh (Yes). Yep.
Q. And who was it that had the idea to implement a three-minute time limit?
A. Well, the actual three-minute, I think that was probably Todd. He had done that before.
Q. And that was utilized at the county commission
only got 11 acres.
Q. But no one has ever approached you and asked you to sign up for a wind easement?
A. A wind easement, no. That's why I don't get invited to any of these parties, because I don't have any -- (Chuckles.)
Q. Do you remember John Homan submitting a special exception permit for a runway?
A. Yeah.
Q. If you turn to page 310 of Exhibit 4 for me.
A. (Complies.)
Q. Is that the special exception permit
application that Mr. Homan submitted to the zoning
officer for his runway?
A. Yeah, looks like it.
Q. And that was filed with the zoning officer in March of 2017; correct?
A. Correct. Yes.
Q. And when he filed this application, there weren't any wind towers around the property where Mr. Homan wanted to place a runway, were there?
A. No, there wasn't any wind towers. It was just everybody was talking about wind towers at that time.
Q. And there was no application to place any wind towers around?

1 letter?
A. No. Huh-uh (No).
Q. And to put it simply, his neighbors didn't have any right to put any wind turbines around?
A. No, they had nothing. I don't know if they had signed leases or why they knew. I don't know about
Q. But even if they had signed leases, they didn't have a right to put a turbine until they'd gotten approval from the Board?
A. I think they had high hopes of getting one, yeah, but they didn't have any permits. Nobody had any. Nothing was going on yet.
Q. Then there was a board meeting that took place in April of 2017 to consider Mr. Homan's application.
Do you recall that meeting?
A. Yeah.
Q. If you flip forward to page 346, on pages 346, 347, and 348 are a letter John Homan wrote to the Deuel County Commissioners. Did you receive this
A. I probably did.
Q. Regardless, in the third paragraph here Mr. Homan is talking about that April zoning board meeting. Do you see that?
A. Yeah.
Q. It says, I attended the April zoning board meeting to apply for the permit in person. The very first question I received from the Board before any question about airports or landing strips was from Mr . Kanengieter and it was, How is this going to affect wind towers?

Did he accurately describe what took place at that April board meeting in that paragraph there?
A. In that third paragraph?
Q. Was the first question from a board member specifically --
A. Yeah, I think it was. Yeah.
Q. And if you go to the next paragraph, he summarizes that board meeting further. It says, The conversation continued for over a half hour and the Board's questions and comments were only concerning wind towers. They went so far as the Board telling me that they would not grant me the permit because in the future some surrounding landowner may want to put up a wind tower on the adjacent property.

Did he accurately summarize what took place in that paragraph?
A. I think that we said we wanted to consider it. I didn't say -- I was pretty quiet. But them other guys, they wanted to consider it. They said they

1 2 that.
Q. What did they want to consider?
A. About the wind towers and his landing strip to see if it was compatible. That's how I remember it.
Q. And, again, there weren't any wind towers around; right?
A. Right.
Q. And there weren't any applications for wind towers that were pending; right?
A. No. Huh-uh (No).
Q. Do you think it made much sense to consider wind towers then with respect to that runway application?
A. Myself, I think it made no sense to ask that question right away.
Q. As I understand it, there were a couple more board meetings regarding Mr. Homan's application for a special exception permit; right?
A. Yes.
Q. Ultimately, he was granted one; right?
A. Yes.
Q. But during those additional meetings where the

Board discussed his special exception permit for a
runway, the vast majority of the discussion took place

## regarding wind towers; right?

A. Right.
Q. And how that runway was going to impact --
A. Right.
Q. -- wind towers?
A. Right. Now, John, he came and I met him in the Cenex one day. I can't remember if that was before the meeting or after the meeting, talking about the landing strip that he wanted to get done.
Q. Mr. Homan is required to sign a letter of assurance. Do you remember that, for his runway application?
A. That's what they called it, yeah.
Q. Whose idea was it to have him sign a letter of assurance?
A. I don't know where the assurance word came from there. But I thought if he just went around and got, from all his neighbors, just to communicate with his neighbors and just so there was communication there so, you know, everything is better with communication. So that's what I suggested. And then I don't know how it evolved to a letter of assurance. I don't know how they did that.
Q. Was it your idea to have a letter of assurance?
A. No, it was my idea to have him --

By MR. ALMOND:
Q. Mr. Rhody, I want to cover a little bit about the Findings of Fact that were prepared for the Invenergy projects.
A. Yeah.
Q. Tell me about how those Findings of Fact were prepared.
A. I think Luke did those.
Q. Luke --
A. From First District.
Q. When was the first time you saw the findings on paper?
A. Hmm? I think that was probably the first time was Luke's findings.
Q. So did Luke come to a board meeting and present you guys with the findings?
A. Luke's been at one of our commissioner meetings. Or you're talking about the zoning meetings?
Q. I'm talking about the Findings of Fact for the Invenergy projects.
A. Yeah. I don't remember if he came or not.
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A. Because he came to one of our meetings, too, didn't he? He introduces himself. You know, they ain't going to sit there and not introduce themself around.
Q. Does Jesse live around here?
A. No, he lives at -I don't know. Someplace in lowa, I think.
Q. And he works for Avangrid Renewables?
A. Avangrid Renewables, yeah. And when this came
up, I knew Jesse and I live down there by them,
Buffalo Ridge there. And I'm only two miles from towers
now. And I - I might have called Jesse or something or
talked to him when I saw him sometime, and I asked him, Well, how do these wind towers and landing strips, how do you do that? And he said, Well, we would just work around it. That's kind of what - And then I talked to the crop duster up at Watertown, and he didn't like -he did not like wind towers. He liked to be at least a half mile back from them. So that's what that refers to.
Q. I'm handing you what has been marked as Exhibit 13. Do you recall ever receiving that e-mail or having that e-mail forwarded to you?
A. I don't remember it. What are these numbers here? And then my name. I have no easement with them. I don't remember it.

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1 2 t 3 did?
Q. But you think he's the one who put them together?
A. I know he put them together, yeah. Yeah.
Q. Did you discuss with him, have any
conversations with him about how to put them together?
A. No.
Q. What to include in them?
A. No.
Q. Do you know if any of the other board members
A. No, I don't think they did. Not that I-I don't think so.
Q. Shifting gears a little bit here. Did Invenergy provide the commissioners, the county commissioners, with information throughout the last two, two-and-a-half years?
A. Throughout the last two-and-a-half years?
Q. Yeah.
A. Yeah, from time to time.
Q. I mean, they were attending meetings --
A. And if we wanted to know something, we would ask them.
Q. And they were submitting information to all the county commissioners. Is that fair?
A. Yes. That's fair.
Q. Do you know approximately how much information Invenergy submitted to the county commissioners leading up to their application?
A. Well, it was a fair bit. I mean, it was whenever we wanted to know something, he would tell us and that's mostly how it worked, I think, if we got curious about something, somebody would ask them about it; or if he had something to tell us, he would send us something.
Q. And was the information that Invenergy submitted to the county commissioners, was that done only through commission meetings, or did they drop stuff you off to the commission office or e-mail the commissioners or anything like that?
A. Oh, I don't really remember if they would e-mail us directly or if they came -- a lot of stuff came from Pam and then to us.
Q. Did Invenergy provide the commissioners of any additional information that wasn't provided to the board members in their application?
A. No, I don't think so. I don't know what it would have been.

MR. ALMOND: I don't have any other questions
for you, Mr. Rhody.
MS. AGRIMONTI: I have a few, Mr. Rhody.
A. Oh, to my recollection, that he had some reservations about it or something. About -- Goll', I just can't remember enough about it. But I know he was talking about his airstrip and he was afraid that it wasn't going to get -- There would be some reason why. I can't really remember why now, but. I know we had a pretty good conversation there, and I agreed with him about a lot of things.
Q. Do you recall how long that conversation was, Mr. Rhody?
A. Yeah, it was a half hour or so.
Q. Do you remember any context of that conversation?
A. Just talking about the airstrip and that I didn't see any reason why you can't have an airstrip, because there isn't any permits out there or nothing. Nobody's even applied for them. I don't see why you can't have it.
Q. Was there anybody else present at that meeting at the Cenex?
A. No, it was just --
Q. So to summarize, Mr. Homan contacted you by phone to ask for a meeting?
A. I believe so.
Q. And then you agreed to meet with him at the

Q. I believe you were asked some questions of Mr. Almond about the Homan airstrip, and you started to talk about meeting John at Cenex, and I would like to ask you some questions about that.
A. Oh, sure.
Q. Did Mr. Homan, Mr. John Homan, approach you in the Cenex?
A. Yeah, we talked on the phone, and then he wanted to talk about this. And I said, Well, sure let's go to the Cenex and have a cup of coffee.
Q. When did he contact you to talk about his airstrip application?
A. You know, I just don't remember if it was before that, after that. But I think it was - I'm pretty sure it was before that. And I know you can't talk otherwise l'd ask you.
Q. Just to be clear, do you believe that conversation occurred before the special exception permit was granted for Mr. Homan's airstrip or after?
A. Oh, I think it was before that.
Q. All right. And what did Mr. Homan request of you?

Cenex for coffee?
A. Yeah. Yep.
Q. And you met for about a half hour?
A. Yep.
Q. And the subject matter at that meeting was the pending application for approval of the airstrip?
A. Yep.

MS. AGRIMONTI: Thank you. That's all I have.

## MR. PETERSON: Any follow-up?

 FURTHER EXAMINATIONBy MR. ALMOND:
Q. That conversation, do you remember if that conversation took place while his permit was pending?
A. I don't think -I don't think so. I don't think he had gone there yet.
Q. You don't think he had submitted his application yet?
A. I don't think so. I don't think he had done that yet. I think he was going to. He wanted, yeah, just talk about it.

MR. ALMOND: Nothing further.
MR. PETERSON: I just have one question.

By MR. PETERSON:
Q. You talked about Todd Kays coming to visit with -- and you said the Board, but I want to get some clarification on this. Did he come to the Board of Adjustment or the county commission?
A. See, I think I'm confused on that. He might have come to the commissioners instead of the Board to tell us how to run that meeting prior to that.
Q. When you're saying "that meeting," are you talking about the meeting at which the new ordinance provisions were being considered?
A. The new ordinance provisions, yeah. It might have been that, and he might have come twice. I can't remember now. But I guess we would have to look back on the minutes to find out if he did or not.
