# **Questions are being asked about Loneman School**

Historically, school boards were formed to provide that conduit through which the community's values and will are channeled into its school. will are channeled into its school. Their predominant duty is to estab-lish policies that serve as adminis-trators' guides for the day-to-day management of their school. In light of these truths, the functions and decisions of a school board are important.

I have now served 14-months of the Isnala Wicasa Owayawa School board. For a newly appointed board member, it was strange to have been elected president as soon as being sworn in. Also on that night the only long-time board member refused the presidency even before nominations began. Any school board needs the experience and training of its members, to enhance their effectiveness.

Anyway, I have been active presiding over school board meetings and observing. Initially, I assumed that the school was doing well. However, as time progressed, I began to see things that do not belong in our school or any school for that matter. Also, casual conversions with community members revealed suspicion and an unusual

for that matter. Also, casual conversions with community members revealed suspicion and an unusual antipathy toward their school and a general feeling of allenation.

T've listed some questions that were asked of me within the past year. I believe these came from older district members who know and understand "local control." "Are we still a contract school?" "Are we going under the state?" and "Why are we going under the state?" and "Theard we are

back under the BIA."

Others have asked, "What is a grant school and what is a BIE school?" "I heard you (school) are using state education standards, so does that mean the school is going under, state jurisdiction?" "How come we don't know about anything that happens at the school?"

"Do you know that some of your employees are saying you guys (school board) don't know what you are doing?"

Much of the confusion in the community seems to arise from the "Grant School" concept. I believe the current grant school (P.L. 100-297) law applies to the funding process only and does not abolish the "638" law. The "100-297" law reaffirms the purposes and goals of the P.L. 39-638 law. Currently, it appears the original 1971 Loneman School Corporation charter no longer exists.

Also, I see what appears to be a

School Corporation charter no longer exists.

Also, I see what appears to be a shift from "local control" to tribal government annexation. My opinion on that is "tribal" government maintains a multitude of programs. It cannot effectively promulgate education under its bureaucratic structure. However, it seems proponents have successfully ceded "local control" of our school to the central multi-faceted governing body.

Have we abandoned the dream Have we abandoned the dream of our predecessors who struggled through the 1960s and early 1970s to be the first on the Pine Ridge to contract educational services from federal government? They dared to delve into independence rather than let someone else take charge of our children's education.

Since December 2016, I learned that the original school charter was revised but the details of the proceedings remain sketchy. Also, I found two sets of policies and procedures for financial accounting. This was corrected recently but the school board's new policy manual does not contain the revisions.

I also found one set of policies for a Board of Directors (corporation) and one for a School Board (education). At present the school board is also struggling to operate under an inconclusive Revised Corporate Charter and Constitution. I have not seen this constitution since I came on board and the current charter appears as if it was written in great haste.

According to school board policy, new board members are to receive training within 90 days of taking their oath of office. This time

period is inadequate. At the same time, board training has been slow in coming and the board is relatively new. Presently, we are left to our own discretion as far as training goes. Despite this situation, the Isnala Wicasa Owayawa school board is doing its best to do its job. Meanwhile, certain school employees, state certified professionals included, have been heard to refer to the school board as "stupid." This is a clear indication of great disrespect for their employer. I am convinced that the board has been intentionally "kept in the dark" and thus "controllable." This situation has confirmed my suspicions about some errant activity in the school.

Adding to our situation, we do not have tangible education-related statistics about our students after they graduate. As the community's education "watchdog" we don't know how many dropped out of high school, how many completed a trade school or graduated college, how many are employed, on welfare, married, single-parent, etc. We have no way to accurately measure progress or failure.

Instead, I am continually hearing of the high dropout rates and low academic achievement levels of our students. We have no local stats to help us verify or refute these long-standing negative statistics. Why do we not have our own? Instead we continually renew the effort to "civilize" them with the latest advances in western academics or with Euro-American values and standards.

As Methodist clergyman Daniel Dorchester (1827-1907) wrote in

1889, "A sincere effort was made to develop the type of school that would destroy 'tribal ways." He was also a statistician of American church history. Today I see our obvious submission to the federal "Kill the Indian, and save the man" policy.

Dropout rates and poor performance are indicative of the deflated self-esteem among our students. As far as academics go, there is not a problem there. The problem is Indian children are not included in the mainstream.

Since 1868, we have been incessantly blitzed with "English education" while Lakota values were obliterated. This makes it very difficult to think "balanced curiculum," which would be an impartial and equal presentation of Lakota and western values. So the new unprecedented task is to produce students capable of living in both worlds as opposed to merely surviving in it.

Imagine bilingual and culturally-competent Lakota attorneys, teachers, scientists, etc. My sincerest hope and goal is for the school board, administration, staff, and the community to achieve a semblance of unity. Only then will we have a chance to establish a future for our children and grandchildren. Our youth deserve a life far better than the one we have endured.

# Porcupine man found guilty of assault and firearm charges

United States Attorney Ron Parsons announced that Kison Robertson, age 45, was found guilty of Assault with a Dangerous Weapon, Assault Resulting in Serious Bodily Injury, and Discharge of a Firearm During the Commission of a Crime of Violence following a federal trial in Rapid City, South Dakota. The jury returned the verdict on March 21, 2018.

The charges carry a mandatory minimum sentence of 10 years' custody, up to a maximum penalty of up to life in custody and/or a \$250,000 fine, 5 years of supervised release, and a \$100 special assessment to the Federal Crime Victims Fund.

Evidence at trial established Robertson shot a man in his stomach following a fight at Torcupine on March 30, 2017. This assault resulted in the victim suffering serious bodily injury.

This case was investigated by the Bureau of Indian Affairs, Office of Justice Services, the Oglala Sioux Tribe Department of Public Safety, and the Federal Bureau of Investigation. Assistant U.S. Attorney Eric Kelderman prosecuted and tried the case. A sentencing date was set for June 22, 2018. Robertson was remanded to the custody of the U.S. Marshals Service pending sentencing.



# C.R.S.T. Telephone Authority

July 1, 2018

Dear C.R.S.T. Telephone Authority Customer,

### Please read this letter carefully.

Individuals who reside on tribal lands and meet the eligibility criteria may qualify for discounts [on the telephone bill] through **Tribal Lifeline and Tribal Link Up programs**. Tribal lands are defined as any federally-recognized Indian tribe's reservation, pueblo, or colony; Indian Allotments; and areas that fall outside the boundaries of existing Tribal lands but have been designated by the Federal Communications Commission as Tribal lands for the purpose of receiving Tribal Lifeline and Tribal Link Up support.

**Tribal Lifeline** helps eligible residents of tribal lands save <u>up to</u> \$34.25 on their monthly phone bill. The discount applies to wireline or wireless residential telephone service plans and is limited to one line per household. **Tribal Link Up** provides a one-time discount for the connection or activation charge for new telephone service at the applicant's primary residence. The discount is a 100 percent reduction, <u>up to</u> \$100, of the customary charge to initiate telecommunications service. Link Up also allows you to pay any remaining amount owed on initiation of service (up to \$200) on a deferred schedule, interest free.

Eligible consumers may also be able to sign up for free toll blocking or toll limitation service that either blocks or limits long-distance calls from your phone.

**Both programs have eligibility requirements.** You may qualify if you, one or more of your dependents, or your household participates in any of the following programs:

- Medicaid (example, Title XIX/Medical State Supplemental Assistance)
- Supplemental Security Income (SSI)
- Veterans Pension & Survivors Benefits Programs
- Federal Public Housing Assistance (Section 8)
- Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP, formerly known as food stamps)
- Bureau of Indian Affairs General Assistance
- Tribally-Administered Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TTANF)
- Head Start (if income eligibility criteria are met)
- Food Distribution Program on Indian Reservations
- Or, if your household income is no more than 135% of the federal poverty income guidelines (see table below).

A representative from Solix will contact you to verify your eligibility and complete the application process. You will be required to provide documentation to prove eligibility.

### Important Information

- Not all telephone providers in South Dakota offer the Tribal Lifeline and Tribal Link Up discounts.
- Tribal Lifeline is available on only one line per household. A household is defined as any individual or group of individuals
  living together at the same address as one economic unit. An "economic unit" consists of all adult individuals contributing
  to and sharing in the income and expenses of a household. A household may include related and unrelated persons.
- Tribal Lifeline and Tribal Link Up discounts cannot be applied to past due telephone bills.
- It can take up to two months for the discounts to show up on your bill as a credit. You must pay the bill until that time.
- Tribal Link Up will not cover the cost of a phone or wiring your home.
- You must notify C.R.S.T. Telephone Authority when you no longer qualify for the program.

# Tribal Lifeline and Tribal Link Up Telephone Assistance Programs Proof of Eligibility

If you qualify for Tribal Lifeline or Tribal Link Up based on income, you may be asked to provide proof of your income. The following documents are acceptable proof:

- Last year's state, federal or tribal tax return
- Current income statement from an employer or paycheck stub
- A Social Security statement of benefits
- A Veterans Administration statement of benefits
- A retirement/pension statement of benefits
- An Unemployment/Worker's Compensation statement of benefits
- A federal or tribal notice letter of participation in General Assistance
- A divorce decree, child support award, or other official document containing income information

If the prospective subscriber presents documentation of income that does not cover a full year, such as current pay stubs, the prospective subscriber must present the same type of documentation covering three consecutive months within the previous 12 months.

If you qualify for Tribal Lifeline or Tribal Link Up based on **program-based eligibility**, you may be asked to provide proof of your eligibility. The following documents are acceptable proof:

- The current or prior year's statement of benefits from a qualifying assistance program
- A notice or letter of participation from a qualifying assistance program
- Program participation documents
- An official document demonstrating that the prospective subscriber, one or more of the prospective subscriber's dependents, or the prospective subscriber's household receives benefits from a qualifying assistance program.



### TRIBAL LIFELINE AND LINKUP PROGRAM

### YOU MAY BE ELIGIBLE FOR DISCOUNTED TELEPHONE SERVICE.

Qualifying customers who reside within the boundaries of the Cheyenne River Sioux Indian Reservation. This program can decrease your local monthly telephone service by as much as \$25,25 per month.

On January 01, 1998, the basic Lifeline and Linkup program was implemented. This program was designed to assist low-income consumers with the cost of basic telephone service. On October 01, 2001, the Enhanced Lifeline and Link-up rules were implemented. This "enhanced" program applies to low income consumers living on tribal lands.

This low income federal telephone assistance program is available to eligible subscribers that are participating in at least one of the following public assistance programs:

- Bureau of Indian Affairs (BIA) general assistance program
- Federal Public Housing Assistance (Section 8)
- Food Distribution Program on Indian Reservations
- Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP, formerly known as food stamps)
- Head Start (meeting income qualifying standards)
- Household Income is at or below 135% of the Federal Poverty Guidelines
- Low Income Home Energy Assistance
- Medicaid (e.g., Title XIX Medical State Supplemental Assistance)
- Supplemental Security Income (SSI)
- Tribally-Administered Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TTANF)





People across the United States rely on phone and internet to stay connected to family, work, education, and essential services. The Lifeline Program provides a monthly benefit to reduce or eliminate the cost of these connectivity services for qualified households.



Millions of people across the United States have no access to the internet services needed to work, learn, and communicate. In an effort to connect people to the services needed to participate and function in today's digital world, the Lifeline Program now includes the option to choose internet.

### **HOW IT WORKS**

Lifeline offers a monthly benefit of \$9.25 to eligible subscribers, or up to \$34.25 to those living on Tribal/Native lands. Subscribers may receive the benefit on either:

Home phone

- Cell phone
- Mobile and home internet
- Internet-phone bundle

To get started, a consumer must select a participating Lifeline service provider in their state and apply for Lifeline through the provider. The provider then supports the consumer through the application process and verifies eligibility. Once enrolled, the provider begins delivering the monthly benefit to the consumer.

Lifeline is the Federal Communications Commission's program to help make communications services more affordable for low-income consumers.

In addition to the \$9.25 monthly benefit, Lifeline subscribers are not billed the monthly federal Universal Service charge (up to \$2.50 per month, depending on the provider).

### **ELIGIBILITY**

Consumers are eligible for a Lifeline benefit if they are currently enrolled in one of the following programs:

- Medicaid
- SNAP (Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program) or Food Stamps
- Supplemental Security Income (SSI)
- Federal Public Housing Assistance
- Veterans Pension and Survivors Benefit
- Reside on Tribal lands and participate in one of the federal or state assistance programs listed above or one of the following Tribal-specific programs: Bureau of Indian Affairs General Assistance, Head Start (those meeting the income standard), Tribal Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (Tribal TANF), or Food Distribution Program on Indian Reservations
- Income-based eligibility (at or below 135% of the federal poverty guidelines)
