3 Northern State buildings evacuated after bomb threat

College campuses in Aberdeen and Watertown were the target of unfounded bomb threats Friday morning.
Aberdeen Police Department, Brown County Sheriff's Office Aberdeen Fire and Rescue and Brown County Emergency Management were all called out at about 9.20 am. to Northern State University after being alerted to the report of an explosive device on eampus. Police Capt. Tanner Jondahl said the caller mentioned the device had a timer

caller mentioned the device had a timer that was counting down, but the call was disconnected before giving a spe-cife location of the device or any other

Jondahl said law enforcement worked with university officials to evac-uate campus buildings in the area where the device was believed to be.

Vice President of Enrollment Com-Vice President of Enrollment Com-munications and Marketing Justin Frasse said the Avera Student Center, Graham Hall and Lincoln Hall were evacuated and subsequently cleared by law enforcement. Jondahl said by the time buildings were evacuated, the reported time left on the explosive device had expired, which added to law enforcement's suc-

which added to law enforcement's sus-picions about the validity of the call. Both the recording and the phone num-ber were computer generated, Jondahl said.
Campus officials were given the all

clear at 10:30 a.m

"We're grateful for the prompt re-sponse by our local public safety offi-cials," NSU President Neal Schnoor said.

As investigators were wrapping up the call at Northern, a similar call came in at 10:45 a.m. reporting a device at Presentation College. According to a news release from Presentation College, no threat was found on campus after a thorough investigation and officials is sued an all-clear at 12:15 p.m., following

sued an all-clear at 12:15 p.m., following which all campus activities resumed. Presentation officials evacuated the main campus building. Police and cam-pus official investigated the matter and no device was found.

Jondahl said investigators also learmed of a similar incident in Watertown at Lake Area Technical College. Watertown's Assistant Police Chief Ryan Remmers said law enforcement received a call at 9:12 am. Remmers said law enforcement also searched that area of campus and no device was found.

Three people from Sioux Falls have been arrested and are being held on a \$10,000 bond each in connection to a robbery Sunday, according to the Min-nehaha County Sheriff's Office.

An off-duty sheriff's deputy was driving eastbound at about 3 p.m. on 1-90, when he saw a man lying on Ditch Road, Cpt. Josh Phillips said during Friday's police briefing. The deputy stopped to assist and found the victim with severe lacerations to his forchead and the back of his head. The victim was taken to a local hospital.

It appeared the victim had been hit with a crowbar, Phillips said.

A witness at the scene who had called 911, also helped render first aid,

since she was a nursing student and had medical supplies in her vehicle. She said when she asked the victim if he knew who had hurt him, he said ves. He said

who had hurt him, he said yes. He said they were after his items, according to court documents. During the investigation, detectives with the sheriff's office determined fi-nancial documents, including a credit card, had been taken from the man, according to court documents.

The three people, two men and one woman, were arrested without incident on Wednesday, Phillips said. They are being charged with first-degree robbery and aggravated assault.
