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CHAIRMAN HANSON: Item No. 2,

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TC04-225, In the matter of the filing by VCI Company for designation as an eligible telecommunications carrier.

Today shall the Commission enter an order designating VCI Company as an ETC for its ETC service area, and shall the Commission provide a certification to the Federal Communications Commission and to the Universal Service Administration Company regarding the plan for the use of federal universal services support?

MS. CREMER: If I may, this is Karen Cremer of staff. I believe that Malia -- I won't even try to pronounce her last name -- from VCI is on the phone and this is an ETC -- it's different from the RCC in that RCC is rural and wireless and this one is wireline and in the Qwest territory. But if for some reason you want to -- the conditions that have come out of that FCC order, if you would want to apply those to VCI or if you want to wait until you've heard the arguments in RCC to make a determination, you could just -- you can hear from VCI but, you know, you can always defer this matter if need be.

I didn't want you to have to have people

arguing that FCC order in this VCI Docket because 1 2 nobody's really prepared to do that where they are 3 prepared in your RCC Docket. CHAIRMAN HANSON: Ms. Tasi, do you 4 have anything to add? 5 MR. EFFERDING: Stan Efferding here 6 from VCI Company, President of VCI Company. 7 Ms. Tasi is not on the line. I don't know that I 8 have anything to add. I think she's accurately 9 described that we work as a wireline carrier in 10 nonrural locations. 11 CHAIRMAN HANSON: Could I have your 12 name again, please, sir. 13 MR. EFFERDING: That's Stan 14 Efferding, E-F-F-E-R-D-I-N-G. 15 16 CHAIRMAN HANSON: Thank you. you're saying you would like this deferred until 17 after we hear the other one? 18 MR. EVANS: I don't have an opinion 19 20 on that. I'm certainly willing to wait and hear the other argument. We just provide low income 21 22 lifeline link-up services. Our experience, we're 23 currently providing that in about eight other states, and our experience is the new FCC order has 24 not been perceived to impact our business. 25

1 CHAIRMAN HANSON: All right. Thank 2 you. 3 Karen. 4 MS. CREMER: I believe he is 5 correct. It was just I didn't know if for some 6 reason you were going to start applying those 7 standards across the board to all the ETCs, you 8 know, if theirs came up first -- and, like I said, 9 they're really not prepared to address all of that. 10 But we could hear this, you know, hear staff's 11 recommendation and see what the Commission wants to 12 do, or you could always defer it. 13 Thank you. I was CHAIRMAN HANSON: 14 going to go to Harlan, but if you have something 15 to -- staff. 16 MS. CREMER: I can just take that, 17 Harlan, if you don't have anything. We've reviewed 18 the application. The only thing, Mr. Efferding, 19 that we were waiting to receive from you, and I 20 talked to Malia about this before and it might be 21 you have since sent it and we just haven't received 22 it yet. 23 The advertising that they're looking to do --24 I don't know, a sample or a letter was put -- was 25 given to the Commissioners and counsel. They plan

on advertising on TV. And they gave us the website and I went out and listened to it. And, you know, truth be told, more people probably watch TV and would pick up their 800 number and would see their advertisement that way than through a newspaper or White Page ads or anything like that.

I have asked them to send a sample of written advertising if they use any written advertisements in other states, and then they needed to update their tariff as to who is eligible for lifeline link-up. They did not have -- they had it right in the tribal area but needed to add TANF and --

MR. EFFERDING: National school lunch.

MS. CREMER: The school lunch program and then the 135 percent income eligibility at some point. And then I'm just waiting to get a Certificate of Service from them that shows that they did provide a copy of this to all the other providers in the Qwest territory. So you could approve it with those conditions. You could defer it until they get us a copy of those couple of things.

CHAIRMAN HANSON: Thank you. Any other questions by the Commission?

COMMISSIONER JOHNSON: Ms. Cremer, what would be your preference, to defer action until that information is in hand?

MS. CREMER: That would be my preference. I know the company would like to move forward, but I really think we would have it by the April 26 meeting and that way staff would have an opportunity -- I know the other thing I'm waiting for is a sample of the service agreement.

I would just like to be able to review those and give them any suggestions if need be before that time or, like I said, you could condition the approval on us getting those matters and them being acceptable.

COMMISSIONER JOHNSON:

Mr. Efferding, Commissioner Johnson here. Would that provide an undue burden on VCI?

MR EFFERDING: I don't believe it would. We've experienced both cases where we've been given conditional approval. Currently in California they're reviewing the very same items you mentioned because they do change. We were afforded a conditional approval and then submitted these items later.

I don't know that we're prepared to enter that

market within the next 30 days so I don't think it 1 would be an undue burden. 2 COMMISSIONER JOHNSON: Thank you 3 very much. 4 VICE CHAIRMAN SAHR: 5 especially if we're waiting on some information and . 6 staff feels the need to review it and we've heard 7 from the company that it shouldn't be anything 8 that's unduly burdensome and, in fact, we have a 9 Commission meeting scheduled for two weeks, in 10 light of all of that, I would move that we defer 11 the matter until the April 26 Public Utilities 12 Commission meeting. 13 MS. AILTS WIEST: Before there's a 14 final vote, could I just ask a few questions of the 15 company at this time in case they need to provide 16 anymore information? 17 CHAIRMAN HANSON: Please. 18 MS. AILTS WIEST: This is 19 Rolayne Wiest, General Counsel with the Commission. 20 Going back to your advertising, Mr. Efferding, I 21 was looking through it, and it didn't appear to 22 actually advertise the benefits available on tribal 23 lands when I looked at that specific advertising. 24 MR. EFFERDING: That's correct. In 25

1 some states the nonrural areas don't have any 2 tribal land so we're careful not to -- that's a 3 generic commercial that you saw. Some states there 4 are tribal lands in rural areas, and, therefore, we 5 have to add that information. We do provide, as 6 required by the FCC, the tribal land discounts. 7 MS. AILTS WIEST: And you do provide advertising? 8 9 MR. EFFERDING: Correct. 10 MS. AILTS WIEST: For tribal lands 11 in commercials? 12 MR. EFFERDING: In Commercials, 13 yeah. We have a three-fold process where we run 14 commercials on television, we put bill inserts in 15 all of our bills that go out each month, and we 16 also send brochures to all of the Social Services 17 offices. 18 MS. AILTS WIEST: Looking at your 19 advertisement, it doesn't appear to advertise 20 link-up, just lifeline. 21 MR. EFFERDING: You're correct. Link-up and lifeline are if you qualify for 22 23 lifeline, you qualify for link-up, and that's 24 promoted to the consumer when they call in. The 25 discounts are in the tariff. The consumer's

1 extended those benefits at the time of call in. 2 MS. AILTS WIEST: You stated you 3 provide wireline services primarily through UNEs. 4 Is there any other way that you provide it? 5 MR. EFFERDING: The UNEs are the 6 only ones that qualify for the discount. There are 7 some areas where UNEs are cost prohibitive and 8 we'll provide resold hot service but those aren't 9 eligible for the federal discount. 10 MS. AILTS WIEST: Right. And I 11 think you also asked for certification; is that 12 correct? 13 MR. EFFERDING: I believe so. 14 MS. AILTS WIEST: And then maybe I 15 should direct this to staff. Have they complied 16 with their requirements about putting in the amount 17 of money that they expect to get or would the --18 the certification requirements that we have put on 19 in the other companies, the money that they 20 would -- are they expecting to get any high-cost 21 money and how they're going to spend that money? 22 I mean, generally before we do certification 23 we ask all the companies to provide that 24 information, and I thought maybe they had just 25 provided it to staff. That might be something you

2 they're asking for certification also. 3 And then you also stated in your petition that 4 the benefit of the public interest statement is who 5 qualified by lowering their telephone bills. What 6 are your rates? 7 MR. EFFERDING: The rates we'll move 8 forward with is \$14 a month. We'll advertise on 9 television, basic monthly service unlimited local 10 dialing. 11 Regarding your question on high-cost, 12 low-income, the FCC does not distinguish -- once 13 the states determine ETC status, the FCC doesn't 14 distinguish between the two. Generally we have to 15 communicate at the local level between the states 16 the message that we're not -- (Inaudible). 17 (Discussion off the record) 18 MR. EFFERDING: -- pursuing 19 high-cost funding. And will not attempt to serve 20 on rural areas. 21 CHAIRMAN HANSON: We're back on the 22 record and, sir, if you would like to continue 23 where you left off. Mr. Schardin (sic). I have the wrong one. Efferding. 24 25 MR. EFFERDING: I'm sorry. I

10	MR. EFFERDING: No.
11	MS. AILTS WIEST: Okay. Thank you.
