3 State Capitol, 500 East Capitol Avenue, Pierre,  
4 South Dakota, on the 2nd day of April, 2019.

1           ACTING CHAIR NELSON: We will go to our first  
2 docket, EL19-003, In the Matter of the Application of  
3 Crowned Ridge Wind, LLC for a Permit of a Wind Energy  
4 Facility in Grant and Codrington Counties.

5           Two questions today. First, shall the  
6 Commission grant party status to any additional persons  
7 who may have filed? And, second, shall the Commission  
8 grant Staff's Motion for Procedural Schedule? Or how  
9 shall the Commission proceed?

10           We're going to take the first question. I  
11 believe the only additional person that has applied for  
12 party status is Patrick Lynch. And I'm simply going to  
13 ask, is there any party that would oppose that  
14 intervention?

15           MS. REISS: No.

16           MR. MURPHY: Commissioner, this is Brian Murphy  
17 from Crowned Ridge Wind. We would not oppose it,  
18 provided it meets the criteria of the other Intervenors.  
19 I don't believe we've seen the Application.

20           ACTING CHAIR NELSON: Okay. You are breaking up  
21 a little bit. But did I understand you to say that you  
22 had not seen the Application?

23           MR. MURPHY: I have not.

24           Miles, have you?

25           MR. SCHUMACHER: No, I have not.

1           ACTING CHAIR NELSON: Okay. Well, it was posted  
2 on our website on March 25 and certainly complies with  
3 our requirements.

4           MR. MURPHY: That was my only question. As long  
5 as you believe it complies with your requirements, we  
6 have no objection.

7           ACTING CHAIR NELSON: Thank you.

8           Any questions from Commissioners? Or motions.

9           COMMISSIONER HANSON: Mr. Chairman.

10          ACTING CHAIR NELSON: Yes.

11          COMMISSIONER HANSON: In Docket EL19-003 I move  
12 that the Commission grant party status to Patrick Lynch.

13          ACTING CHAIR NELSON: Discussion on the motion.

14          Hearing none, all those in favor will vote aye;  
15 those opposed, nay.

16          Commissioner Fiegen.

17          COMMISSIONER FIEGEN: Fiegen votes aye.

18          ACTING CHAIR NELSON: Commissioner Hanson.

19          COMMISSIONER HANSON: Aye.

20          ACTING CHAIR NELSON: And Nelson votes aye. The  
21 motion carries.

22          The second question then is Staff's Motion for a  
23 Procedural Schedule. And since it's Staff's motion, I  
24 will let them go first.

25          MS. REISS: Thank you, Mr. Chair. This is

1 Amanda Reiss for Staff.

2 Staff filed our request for a Motion for  
3 Procedural Schedule, and we would ask today that the  
4 Commission adopt that procedural schedule with a couple  
5 of changes.

6 First, after review, we realize that the date we  
7 proposed for the exhibit/witness list is the day before  
8 the hearing would be intended to start so we would ask to  
9 change that and move it back to the 6th of June just to  
10 give all the parties enough time to review those and file  
11 any motions they may have regarding any of those exhibits  
12 or witnesses.

13 And then in response to Crowned Ridge's  
14 comments, Staff would have no objection to moving the  
15 Supplemental Testimony from April 8 to the 10th.  
16 However, when it comes to their second proposal for an  
17 additional date, we're not sure that the 18th or 19th as  
18 proposed would work. We're not opposed to the idea.  
19 We're willing to work on that, but we need to find a date  
20 that's appropriate for everyone.

21 ACTING CHAIR NELSON: Thank you.

22 Crowned Ridge.

23 MR. SCHUMACHER: Miles Schumacher. Thank you,  
24 Commissioner. I think I'll defer to Brian Murphy. He  
25 has up-to-date information. We may have the availability

1 of another witness who can cover that testimony.

2 MR. MURPHY: This is Brian.

3 First, we have no issue with moving to June 6  
4 for the exhibit. And on the second, if it's the  
5 Commission's preference, we could have another witness  
6 substitute for the witness not available the 11th to the  
7 14th.

8 We prefer to have the witness we sponsored  
9 testify and she's available the 18th through the 21st of  
10 the next week but we are amenable either way.

11 ACTING CHAIR NELSON: Thank you. And I will go  
12 through and ask the Intervenors if they have any  
13 comments. I will go just in the order that I've got them  
14 listed.

15 Amber Christenson.

16 MS. CHRISTENSON: Hi. Amber Christenson. I'm  
17 okay with the 6-6 change. I think that's an improvement.

18 I'm not okay with waiting until April 10. We  
19 have filed a motion to resist that. And they don't have  
20 their permit at the county, and that permit hearing is  
21 April 8. And I believe we are already short on time so  
22 that two days makes a big difference to me.

23 That would be all I have to say.

24 ACTING CHAIR NELSON: Thank you.

25 Kristi Mogen.

1 MS. MOGEN: I concur with Amber. I would like  
2 to add that -- sorry. Kristi Mogen.

3 I would like to add that we feel that this is --  
4 the Applicant is running the clock on us, and we are  
5 getting shorted on time. And, you know, when we have  
6 already had maps and things change the validity of what  
7 they have filed, we can't even work off of it because  
8 we're still waiting to find out if they're going to make  
9 another change.

10 This is a time thing, and we need our time to  
11 get our witnesses to evaluate this information. And they  
12 did postpone the local -- the local Application. So they  
13 knew that when they -- when they made that postponement,  
14 and I think we should stick to the April 8.

15 ACTING CHAIR NELSON: Thank you.

16 Melissa Lynch.

17 MS. LYNCH: Yes. Melissa Lynch here.

18 Yeah. I would agree with Amber and Kristi. It  
19 seems like the timelines keep getting wiggled around,  
20 and I'm not sure why that would be continued to be  
21 allowed.

22 I agree with Kristi that it's difficult for us  
23 already to get through all of this paperwork that they  
24 have submitted, and it keeps changing. There's different  
25 maps occurring. And once I feel like I've gotten kind of

1 a handle on what they've submitted, then it changes. And  
2 just a continuing push back of dates doesn't feel  
3 appropriate.

4 You know, I'm a citizen and I have a family and  
5 we have jobs and we're contributors to the community and  
6 it's already difficult to try to get all of this taken in  
7 and understood. One, just the sheer volume of the  
8 information; two, the constant changing of information;  
9 and, three, the constant moving of dates to align with  
10 their needs.

11 So I -- I agree. I disagree with allowing a  
12 change to these dates.

13 ACTING CHAIR NELSON: Thank you. And our newest  
14 Intervenor, Patrick Lynch.

15 Patrick, I'm not hearing you.

16 MR. LYNCH: Can you hear me now?

17 ACTING CHAIR NELSON: I can, yes.

18 MR. LYNCH: Okay. It's more clear than it was  
19 earlier?

20 ACTING CHAIR NELSON: Much more, yes.

21 MR. LYNCH: Okay. Great.

22 So I do have two issues. I did provide them to  
23 Amanda Reiss in written comments, but I'll just go ahead  
24 and overview what I did supply to her.

25 So I'm working on, you know, engaging experts,



1 specifically in the sound study because, you know, I  
2 live -- there's turbines scheduled to be right next to me  
3 in the quarter next to me. I'm very concerned about that  
4 affect on my family.

5 And so they filed what they called the final  
6 Crowned Ridge Wind Farm sound study. So I thought that  
7 was the final report, and that was on 1-30. And then  
8 they updated on 2-27. And now at the public hearing  
9 Tyler just stated that they just finished micrositing of  
10 the site of the turbines.

11 So to me that means if they just finished  
12 micrositing, now I'm expecting more updated elevation and  
13 distance maps and those items if they were just finishing  
14 those. So there's no way the current report can be the  
15 final report.

16 And, you know, every time it changes this is  
17 costing me money and time. And it just keeps getting  
18 pushed out. And, you know, I only have time to review  
19 this stuff on nights and weekends and work with other  
20 people to get that done.

21 So, I mean, I think it's only fair right now  
22 that they push it out 28 days. I think the -- at least  
23 the evidentiary hearing and the prefiled exhibits due  
24 dates, I think all of those need to get pushed out at  
25 least 28 days. And then if they submit another -- or if

1 they have more updates, which I can't believe they can't  
2 have more updates if they just finished microsites, I  
3 think we need even additional time pushed out to be able  
4 to review that and be able to have, you know, experts  
5 review that.

6 I just -- I don't see how we couldn't at least  
7 push -- to me right now we need to push that prefiled  
8 exhibits due date out to July 9, and then -- for the 8th  
9 and then the 9th through the 12th for the evidentiary  
10 hearing. An additional time on top of that, I guess, if  
11 they submit an updated map. That's just my feeling on  
12 the topic.

13 ACTING CHAIR NELSON: Thank you.

14 Staff, any rebuttal?

15 MS. REISS: Thank you, Mr. Chair. This is  
16 Amanda Reiss for Staff.

17 As Mr. Lynch indicated, he did express his  
18 concerns with me yesterday via e-mail, and I suggested he  
19 bring those up with the Commission. And while we're  
20 sympathetic to what he's saying and understand what he's  
21 saying, we do need to stick to the six-month statutory  
22 time frame.

23 And so Staff proposed the best possible schedule  
24 we could based on that time frame. And at this point we  
25 just don't see how we could possibly move it back to

1 July 9 for an evidentiary hearing and still get the  
2 opinion out within that six months, which I believe is  
3 July 30.

4 If the changes to the Application are  
5 significant, there are options for the Intervenors to  
6 look at, such as asking the Commission to dismiss, and  
7 the Applicant could refile. And those are discussions we  
8 could have further on in the process. But we did try to  
9 propose the most fair procedural schedule based off of  
10 the statutory time frame.

11 ACTING CHAIR NELSON: Thank you.

12 Questions from the Commissioners.

13 Commissioner Fiegen.

14 COMMISSIONER FIEGEN: No questions.

15 ACTING CHAIR NELSON: Commissioner Hanson.

16 Commissioner Hanson, not hearing you.

17 COMMISSIONER HANSON: Having a little bit of a  
18 challenge. Can you hear me now?

19 ACTING CHAIR NELSON: Yes.

20 COMMISSIONER HANSON: Thank you.

21 I'm wondering what Ms. Reiss can tell us from  
22 the standpoint of providing additional time for the  
23 Intervenors here. I have quite a concern. And I  
24 appreciate the time frame that they're dealing with and  
25 the challenges that they have and certainly we've --

1 that's been the focal point of legislation, so that we  
2 could take care of this type of a situation.

3 However, it's -- that legislation will not --  
4 even though it's been passed, will not take effect for  
5 this particular docket.

6 And it seems that there's some dilatoriness on  
7 the part of the Applicant, and they should be ready to go  
8 when we -- when we receive their Application, and they  
9 shouldn't be able to continually postpone and -- it  
10 places a tremendous disadvantage on the Intervenor, and  
11 I'm wondering what can be done to provide more  
12 opportunity for the Intervenor here.

13 Do you have any suggestion for me other than  
14 stating that we don't have enough time and the  
15 Applicant's going to have to refile?

16 MS. REISS: Sure. Thank you, Commissioner  
17 Hanson. This is Amanda Reiss again.

18 One issue we would note or one deadline we would  
19 note is that the Rebuttal Testimony is technically  
20 available to all parties. It's not been limited to just  
21 the Applicant or Staff. All parties may submit Rebuttal  
22 Testimony. The deadline for that would be May 24.

23 If the Intervenors' testimony they would like to  
24 submit, especially the expert witnesses, could be  
25 classified as Rebuttal Testimony, they could have up to

1 May 21 based on the procedural schedule.

2 We did -- after receiving input from the  
3 Intervenors, we did look to see if there was an  
4 additional week at the end of June that could accommodate  
5 an evidentiary hearing, and there was nothing after  
6 June 11.

7 Based on that, I do struggle with the ability to  
8 move our deadlines very much, but we can continue  
9 looking, if the Commission so chooses. Additionally, in  
10 the past, although we have required all parties to submit  
11 prefiled testimony in the past, the Commission has been a  
12 bit lenient on allowing the parties to supplement and  
13 revise their testimony at the hearing if required.

14 So if there's later -- if there's testimony  
15 submitted or exhibits submitted at a time where the  
16 Intervenors feel like they cannot respond appropriately  
17 on the Rebuttal Testimony or testimony deadlines, they  
18 can supplement at the evidentiary hearing as well.

19 COMMISSIONER HANSON: And thank you.

20 Mr. Chair, if I could continue.

21 That explanation that you just gave, have you  
22 explained that carefully to the Intervenors at this  
23 juncture? I know that they heard it just now when you  
24 were talking. But being novices to something of this  
25 nature, there might be some challenges for them.

1 MS. REISS: Sure. Staff could certainly follow  
2 up with the Intervenors and make sure that this is put in  
3 writing and that there's an understanding with them, as  
4 well as possible options that they can work with.

5 COMMISSIONER HANSON: Thank you very much. I  
6 really appreciate all the work that you've gone through  
7 on this. I know it's a real challenge and especially  
8 with the -- what we've discussed here today.

9 Can you tell me how many data -- Data Requests  
10 you've asked of the Applicant at this juncture? Do you  
11 know?

12 MS. REISS: At this time we've issued two data  
13 sets to the Applicant and anticipate issuing a few more.

14 COMMISSIONER HANSON: Okay. And have they  
15 complied -- or answered those Data Requests?

16 MS. REISS: Yes. They have responded to those  
17 Data Requests. We would also, though, at this point -- I  
18 believe we've discussed it with them, asked for the  
19 cumulative impact study. But we've been in discussions  
20 with the Applicant, and they've been attempting to get  
21 all of us -- or get the information we request in a  
22 timely manner.

23 COMMISSIONER HANSON: Okay. Thank you very  
24 much.

25 Thank you, Chairman. And I do appreciate all

1 the work you've gone through on this, you and the rest of  
2 the Staff, Ms. Reiss.

3 Thank you.

4 ACTING CHAIR NELSON: Any additional questions?  
5 Motions.

6 I will move in EL19-003 that we adopt the  
7 procedural schedule as provided by Staff with two  
8 exceptions, the first being moving the Applicant's  
9 Supplemental Testimony due date to April 10 and that the  
10 witness and prefiled exhibits due date be June 6.

11 Discussion on the motion.

12 Well, this has become a familiar refrain here,  
13 but we all understand that with the current statutory  
14 six-month time frame everyone is more than crunched to  
15 get everything accomplished that needs to be within that  
16 six months. And I appreciate Staff struggling through  
17 trying to create the most equitable schedule that they  
18 can, given that statutory restriction. And that's just,  
19 frankly, the wall that we're up against. I think that  
20 they've done the best job that they can.

21 And understanding that this is not the only  
22 issue that we're dealing with as we go into the summer of  
23 2019. There are a whole number of other siting  
24 applications that we're working through at the same time,  
25 along with other Commission business.

1 Additional discussion.

2 COMMISSIONER HANSON: Mr. Chair.

3 ACTING CHAIR NELSON: Yes.

4 COMMISSIONER HANSON: I really appreciate the  
5 changes to the motion that you made for April 10 and  
6 June 6. That's very appropriate, and I'll certainly be  
7 supporting that.

8 At the same time, I am sympathetic to the  
9 Intervenors' ability for due process. Changing all the  
10 different things, whether it's information or schedules  
11 or siting of locations, et cetera. I can see that that  
12 would create a significant challenge for folks that are  
13 attempting to get things put together. And, like you  
14 say, we've heard this previously. We've seen the  
15 challenges before.

16 And this is not the first Application for  
17 Crowned Ridge. I'm disappointed that they've had to  
18 change things so many times, and they may wish to --  
19 well, they certainly want to address that going forward  
20 here. So I appreciate the motion. I'm going to vote for  
21 it.

22 But I'm inclined to be very concerned going  
23 forward pertaining to how quickly Crowned Ridge can reply  
24 to data sets and how consistent we can remain for the  
25 rest of this process so there aren't so many changes.



1 Well, there shouldn't be at this juncture.

2 Thank you, Mr. Chair.

3 ACTING CHAIR NELSON: Additional discussion.

4 COMMISSIONER FIEGEN: I will be supporting the  
5 motion. And I am thankful that another witness has been  
6 able to be found to come for Crowned Ridge during this  
7 evidentiary hearing because it would be unbearable for  
8 our Intervenors to have to come back in another week.

9 So I support your motion, Acting Chairman  
10 Nelson.

11 ACTING CHAIR NELSON: Thank you. And I'll just  
12 follow a comment on that.

13 There is no way that I would have supported  
14 adding that additional day a week later. Again, we've  
15 got the six-month time frame, and stretching that out  
16 just is not something that's doable. So they're going to  
17 have to figure out how to make their case in the time  
18 allotted.

19 With that, all those in favor will vote aye;  
20 those opposed, nay.

21 Commissioner Fiegen.

22 COMMISSIONER FIEGEN: Fiegen votes aye.

23 ACTING CHAIR NELSON: Commissioner Hanson.

24 COMMISSIONER HANSON: Aye.

25 ACTING CHAIR NELSON: And Nelson votes aye.
