45	pipeli	pipeline will be a large increase in the assessed valuations of property within each school district			

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it crosses. The increase can only be seen as a positive development for those districts, through an increase in the tax base.

8. What are the expected school tax effects of an increase in value?

Answer: Mill levies may be lowered by the districts, which will lower property taxes through out the school district. Alternatively, school district tax revenue will increase, without an increase in taxes to others. It is also possible that there may be any combination of the two alternatives.

9. Is there any downside to new taxable value coming to School Districts?

Answer: None of which I am aware.

11. What are the expected effects if any on Special Education Funds?

Answer: Again, the district may choose to lower its levy or it can raise much more revenue without raising taxes. There are statutory fund balance caps with penalties attached, so it would be to the district's benefit to lower its local levy and reduce taxes paid if it generates more money than it needs in special education.

12. What are the expected effects on Capital Outlay Funds?

Answer: The effects are the same as in the answer for Special Education funds, with the exception of the fund balance cap. There are tight restrictions as to how capital outlay funds may be spent.

13. Are there any expected effects on pension funds?

Answer: The district could increase their revenue in the pension fund without raising taxes, or they could lower the levy which would lower taxes and at the same time the district would maintain the same amount of revenue.

14. Will there be any effects on South Dakota School Districts outside the pipeline corridor area? If so, what will they likely be?

Answer: Yes there will be positive effects for all school districts in the state. Anytime the overall assessed valuation increases within the state, we see a decrease in the mill levy set at the state level. When new value like this is created we all pay less in taxes.

15. Are there expected effects on opt-outs?

Answer: Yes, in the event that a school district in the pipeline path would need to have an opt out, the overall increase in valuation would cause the existing taxpayers to pay less to fund the opt out. Because the pipeline is new valuation added to the district, the owners of the

pipeline would carry their share of the opt out burden, thus lowering the cost to existing taxpayers. Do you have a position on the granting of a permit by the Commission for the 16. **Keystone Pipeline Project?** Answer: I am in favor of the pipeline as it relates to the positive effect created by significant increases to the assessed valuations and the resulting potential of lowering the burden on existing taxpayers.
