As an affected landowner, I am asking the PUC to turn down the permit by Navigator Heartland Greenway, requesting to build a carbon sequestration pipeline through Minnehaha County.

I own a tillable parcel in Red Rock Township. This land has a Minnehaha County Housing Eligibility attached to, which is highly valued. If this carbon sequestration pipeline is built as requested, it will run immediately west of my farmland, making the Housing Eligibility worthless. This has a huge negative financial impact on my family.

The safety concerns are nearly immeasurable with pressurized carbon running just a few feet underground. Accidents happen every day. It is unjust to expect current residents along the pathway to give up their personal safety so that out-of-state investors can make money. It is unethical.
