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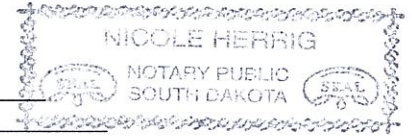

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Highmore-Harrold sports trivia

Susan Bast compiled various sports trivia from the Highmore and Harrold School sports past to be shared with those in attendance during the Blast from the Past alumni basketball game. Announcer Carrie Stephenson read the following information in bits during various breaks in the action.

In 1925-26, the Highmore quintet won the district championship and was runner-up for the championship of all South Dakota. They received the silver Basketball Trophy which is displayed in the trophy case out in the lobby of the Auditorium.

The Harrold school mascot was the Hustlers before they became the Cardinals.

In 1950, the girls' basketball team roared through all opposition and won 15 straight games for an undefeated season. Highmore won the Oahe Conference championship.

In 1950, the boys' basketball team grabbed the District 15 tournament from arch-rival Miller. The Rustlers had a strangle hold on the district crown for several years and the Pirates were able to come through with a district title first since 1939. Members of the team were Mickey Sherer, Buzz Kusser, Tim Volz, Don Matre (Great-Grandpa to Carson and Carly Stephenson), Wayne Houdek, Paul Gormely, Lyle Walker, Clare Bedsaul, Terry O'Brien, Fred Wemmering and Coach Mr. Putman. Another fact, 63 students made up the high school band.

A 1951 March snowstorm strands 1,500 basketball fans in Highmore. The Region 4 boys' basketball tournament was being played in the newly built Hyde County Memorial Auditorium with the Harrold Cardinals as champions. Many stayed in local homes and the auditorium. The next day was spent digging out hundreds of stranded cars and opening roads. Clarence Busse and Art

Cowan rode their horses to town to help and school custodian put on a pair of skis to get to work.

The 1951 State Champions were the Harrold Cardinals. Members of the team were Marty Stiefel, Ken Syler, Lien Marso, Don Bohning, DeWayne Misterik, Rolly Gramm, Marvin Keller, Jim Endres, Jerald Thorn, Gerald Schafer, and Coach Verle Heiter. Three Harrold Cardinals were named to the All-Tournament team: Marty Stiefel, Lien Marso and DeWayne Misterik.

Little Miss Cindy Hamlin Volek was the cheerleading mascot for the 1956-57 boys' basketball team. That year, the boys' B team went undefeated with 18 wins - the only undefeated B team in the State.

In 1962, little Miss Susie Hamlin Bast was the Pirate mascot helping the cheerleaders of Carol Ann Baloun, Donna Jean Hamlin, Gwendolyn Blackwell and Cathie Weber cheer on the Pirate basketball team to the District 16 crown. They had an HHS jug as a symbol of sportsmanship and team support. The class yelling the loudest at a pep meeting got the jug. Members of the 1962 team were David Parlin, David Day, Mike Newton, Jim Jirsa, Gordon Sampson, James Spletstoesser, Neil Nickelson, Jerry Shepherd, Merle Morford, Randy DeWolf, Randy Jirsa, Kenny Huber, Larry Kindopp, Tom Hamlin, Bob Sharp, Maurice Jones, Mike Durfee, Bob McKelvey, Bill Miller, Mike Ferris, Tim McDermott Larry Parlin, Kenneth Goehring and Terry Sampson.

In 1984, there were 6 sets of sisters playing basketball for the Lady Cardinals: Pam and Cindy Bourk, Tracey and Gerry Ogle, Mary and Kayt Hattum, Sarah and Stephanie Winckler, Kris and Jackie Heintz and Roanna and Reva Reding.

In 1972, the boys' basketball team accomplished the best

season in 43 years, they won the Holiday Tournament held in Highmore and won the District 15 championship game. Members were Tim Houdek, Dean Marlow, Craig DeShazer, Mike Parker, Jim Newton, Rod Fieldsend, Mike Mason, Rod Kautz, David Peterson, Bill Cermak, and Coaches Tom Auchampach and Steve Kattke.

In 1973, the student body of HHS invented the Jolly Roger spirit flag which was given to the class who yelled the loudest at a pep meeting then that class flew it at the home basketball games.

In 1978, the girls' basketball team was runner-up in the State Tournament losing to the Jefferson Hawkettes.

In 1981, the "Cardiac Kids" prevailed to the finals of the State Championship game, taking second in the State. Team Members were: Ricki Kusser, Cheryl Mewes, Lori Garrigan, Budi Kusser, Tara Corbin, Joann Gaer, Janell Houdek, Lori Klebsch, Kim Williams, Dorinda Weidenbach, Mary Kay Boschee, Mary Beth Hamlin, Tracy Boller, Mary Jane Lusk, Myra Hoffman, Julie Oligmueller, Mary Kay Tabbert, Tara Corbin and Samie Dancy. Coaches were Don Rogers and Roger Edwards.

In 1984, the Pirates' girls' basketball cheerleaders won the sportsmanship trophy for District 15. Members were Mary Wortman, Diane Schmidt, Pam Faulstich and Deb Hirsch.

In 1992, the Harrold boys' basketball team won the State B Championship. Team members were: Cade Caldwell, Eric Lappe, Brian Marso, Bill Scheid, Joe Ingle, Quinton Bauer, John Onken, Rocky Hapney, Ryan Marso, Marc Finley, Tim Big Eagle, and Coach Dennis Bauer and Assistant Jerry Lihns.

Most 3-point baskets made in a State B tournament was set in 1992 by Eric Lappe of Harrold with 13.

Most points in a State Championship game was set by Harrold with 84 points and Wagner with 79 in the 1992 State B Tournament.

Throwing this tidbit in: A brand-new chant could be heard in the Hyde County Memorial Auditorium in 1993: Bump, Set, Kill! Fourteen girls made history by being the first ever volleyball team in Highmore High School. Members were Carrie Brueggeman, Teka Rickett, Amy Fausett, Nicholette Becker, Mandy Busse, Tara Quinn, Becky Krick, Becky Wheeldryer, Jamie Rinehart, Kristin Tabbert, Shannon Gutzmer, Crystal Bonnichsen, Trish Mewes, Jenny Morford, Shannon Luke and Coach

In 1994, the cheer "Here We Come State, Here We Come" could be heard from Harrold's Lady Cardinals after taking the Region Tournament. The girls took fourth place in their first-ever trip to the State B's. Team members were Heather Ritter, Tennile Keller, Valerie Fanger, Amber Hobert, Bobbie Hansen, Stacey Big Eagle, Bobbie Burnham, Becky Gregg, Michelle Meyer and Pam Leesman. Coaches were Brad Caldwell and Lynette Hoffman.

On November 18, 1995, Senior Crystal

Bonnichsen received the Tourney game ball for scoring a career total of 1,000 points. She earned the points in three years of varsity play.

The Harrold School had four Harrold graduates return to teach at Harrold School including Alvin Winckler, Gary Heintz, Dennis Marso and Brian Marso.

1996 - Auditorium floor reflects community pride. Spearheaded by the Hyde County Action Club, the community of Highmore and Hyde County pulled together and raised \$40,000 to help cover

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the cost of installing a new wood floor in the auditorium.

The 1996 boys' basketball team captured the District 6B championship. Members were Jasor Campbell, Andy Fausett, Dan Vlcek, Quinton Cermak, Jason Stirling, Cody Zilverberg, Briar Suh, Jim Stephenson, Pete Thingelstad, Jesse Klebsch, Robbi Sheffield, Nathan Spilde, Ryan

Pursuant to SDCL Chapter 49-41B, the South Dakota Public Utilities Commission (Commission) will hold public input meetings at the above times and places on an application filed by SCS Carbon Transport LLC (Applicant) to construct a carbon dioxide (CO2) transmission pipeline (Project). The Project, which has been named the Midwest Carbon Express pipeline, is approximately 2,500 miles of pipelines for the transportation of CO2 from ethanol plants across 5 states, including 15 in South Dakota, to sequestration sites in North Dakota. The main line of the proposed route enters South Dakota in Lincoln County at the Iowa/South Dakota border and extends in a northwesterly direction, exiting the state at the South Dakota/North Dakota border in McPherson County. Major components and associated facilities planned in South Dakota are expected to include pump stations, main line valves, launcher-receiver sites, and approximately 16 total miles of temporary and permanent access roads as part of the Project. In addition to the main line and other components, the proposed Project includes lateral and trunk lines connecting ethanol plants throughout the eastern part of South Dakota to the main line. The total proposed length of pipelines through South Dakota is approximately 698 miles and will cross the counties of Beadle, Brookings, Brown, Clark, Codington, Davison, Edmunds, Grant, Hamlin, Hand, Hyde, Kingsbury, Lake, Lincoln, McCook, McPherson, Minnehaha, Miner, Sanborn, Spink, Sully, Turner, and Union. Applicant estimates the total cost of the proposed Project in South Dakota to be \$1,351,563,747.

The purpose of the public input meetings will be to hear public comments regarding the permit Application and the Project. At the meetings, Applicant will present a brief description of the Project, after which interested persons may appear and present their views, comments, and questions regarding the Application. A copy of the Application is on file with the auditor in each of the above listed counties pursuant to SDCL 49-41B and at the Commission's office in Pierre. The Application and all other documents in the docket, including detailed maps of the Project, may be accessed on the Commission's website at puc.sd.gov under Commission Actions, Commission Dockets, 2024 Hydrocarbon and Carbon Dioxide Pipeline Dockets, HP24-001.

Pursuant to SDCL 49-41B-17, the parties to this proceeding are currently the Applicant and the Commission Staff. Each municipality, county, and governmental agency in the area where the facility is proposed to be sited; or any person residing in the area where the facility is proposed to be sited; or any directly interested person, may be granted party status in this proceeding by making timely written application to the Commission. Applications for party status will be available at the public input meetings or may be obtained from the Commission's website. Applications for party status must be received by the Commission on or before 5:00 p.m., CT, January 24, 2025. The Commission will also accept comments in writing from anyone, either by mail, personal delivery, or e-mail until the time of the final decision. You only need to apply for party status if you want to participate formally in the case by putting on testimony or other factual evidence, conducting discovery, cross-examining witnesses, making legal arguments, and to preserve your right to appeal to the courts if you do not believe the Commission's decision is legally correct. You do not need to have party status in order to submit written comments.

Following the public input meetings, the Commission may schedule a formal evidentiary hearing conforming to SDCL Chapter 1-26 to consider issues raised by any party or the Commission itself. At such a formal hearing, all parties will have the opportunity to appear, present evidence, and cross-examine the other parties' witnesses, and exercise all other rights afforded by SDCL Chapters 1-26, 49-1, and 49-41B and ARSD Chapters 20:10:01 and 20:10:22, including rights of appeal to the courts.

For approval, the Applicant must show that the proposed Project will comply with all applicable laws and rules, will not pose a threat of serious injury to the environment nor to the social and economic condition of inhabitants or expected inhabitants in the siting area, will not substantially impair the health, safety or welfare of the inhabitants, and will not unduly interfere with the orderly development of the region with due consideration having been given to the views of governing bodies of affected local units of government. Based upon these factors, the Commission will decide whether the permit to construct should be granted, denied, or granted upon such terms, conditions, or modifications of the construction, operation, or maintenance as the Commission finds appropriate.

Pursuant to SDCL 49-41B-28, a permit from the Commission for the construction of a transmission facility may supersede or preempt any county or municipal land use, zoning, or building rules, regulations, or ordinances upon a finding by the Commission that such rules, or regulation, or ordinances, as applied to the proposed route, are unreasonably restrictive in view of existing technology, factors of cost, or economics, or needs of parties where located in or out of the county or municipality. Without such a finding by the Commission, no route shall be designated which violates local land-use zoning, or building rules, or regulations, or ordinances.
