Hello,
We live near Lake Campbell in Brookings County. My husband Mark and I purchased our family home from my father in 2008. We love this area, and members of our family are interested in purchasing our home when we decide to sell it someday.

The proposed route of the pipeline puts it approximately ¼ mile to the north of our house and ½ mile to the west of our house. This is very concerning to us. There is a lot of information on the effects of a rupture and the danger to people, pets and livestock. We are also concerned about the possible effects on our property value. The pipeline will not cross our land. As such we cannot refuse easements presented to us, and do not have much say in the route of the pipeline.

We have read information supporting and opposing CO2 capture and sequestration, and are not convinced that it will have a positive impact on climate change. The large amount of water and electricity needed to capture and transport the CO2 significantly reduces any positive impact. We are concerned about the amount of water needed. Clean water is a valuable resource and will likely become more so in the future.

According to the information guide to siting pipelines, SCS must show that they will not substantially impair the health, safety or welfare of the

inhabitants. With the pipeline coming within ¼ mile of our house I don't think they can guarantee our health, safety and welfare.

SCS must also show that they will not unduly interfere with the orderly development of the region. Brookings is being developed to the south. The pipeline route is south of Brookings. This will very likely affect the future development of Brookings, and increase the population that resides close to the pipeline. The Lake Campbell area is also growing with new housing developments, increasing the amount of people who could be impacted by a rupture or leak.

Summit Carbon Solutions is not a common carrier. They are a private company who will be making a lot of money from the 45Q tax credit (and possibly other tax credits). Our tax dollars will be paid to a private company when there is no benefit to us or to the general public, instead there are potential risks to our health and safety.
