In keeping with our efforts to keep you updated about the pending electric rate case before the South Dakota Public Utilities Commission (SDPUC), we are notifying you that starting on July 1, 2015, NorthWestern Energy will implement an interim increase in accordance with state law (SDCL 49-34A-17). The interim rate increase will remain in effect until a final decision regarding our requested rate increase is made by the SDPUC. If the SDPUC establishes a final rate that is lower than the interim rate, customers will receive a refund of the difference with interest. 
