Q. How long have you lived in the area?

6 All of my life (74 years)!

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Q. How has the area changed since you've lived there?

Our neighborhood area has seen many changes. South Dakota State Highway 20 was built in 1959, it's on the North side of our farmstead. The WAPA grid lines and towers came through our properties later; we have two on cropland and one on a pasture. We were paid \$150 for those on cropland and \$75 for the one on pasture. We did not mind because thousands of electricity consumers benefitted from this part of the grid system. There is a 66-tower Conde Wind Farm (99 MW) just to the Northwest. A 19.5 MW Oak Tree Wind Farm is to the South.

We and neighbors planted many trees in shelter belts to help preserve the soils and provide some wildlife habitat. Many of us continue to grow grasslands and alfalfa for forage, for rotation purposes and to combat soil erosion. Country churches and schools have closed. The Bradley School closed during the 1970s. Farming operations have grown in size in order to achieve necessary economies of scale. Thus the area population has declined. Many farmers have retired, sold their land and moved to town. And many friends have passed away. Some were fortunate enough to pass their land on to their future generation(s). There are fewer in the area that live off the land, yet they have to continually battle the agricultural price cycles of the livestock and grain.

We raise beef cattle and run a cow/calf operation, grow forage crops, corn, soybeans and some wheat.
