I. INTRODUCTION & BACKGROUND

- 3 Q. Please state your name and address.
- 4 A. My name is Wendy Christman, and my address is 16049 420 Ave, Clark SD 57225.
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6 Q. Please describe your familiarity with the Crocker Wind Farm (the "Project").

A. I am a participating landowner in the Project. When Crocker Wind Farm, LLC
("Crocker" or "Applicant") came to our family with the opportunity to be participating
landowners in the Project, we decided it was what was best for our land, our family,
and our community.

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12 **Q. What is the purpose of your testimony?**

A. The purpose of my testimony is to explain the benefits the Project will bring to our
 entire community, and how the Project will aid people, like my family, who seek to
 continue making a living off the land. I also want to increase awareness that it is the
 consumer and society in general who are <u>demanding</u> renewable, green energy as
 the way of the future.

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19 **Q. Please describe your home.**

A. My husband and I purchased our farm in the Crocker Hills in 1979 and we have lived
 there ever since. We raise beef cattle, grains, and hay. We also love to hunt and
 fish. Annually, for over 30 years, we have raised and released pheasants into food
 plots and shelter belts, which we, ourselves, planted. We take good care of our land
 and consider ourselves conservationists. The decisions we make are always for the
 betterment of the land.

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27 II. BENEFITS OF THE PROJECT

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29 Q. Why did you decide to participate in the Project?

A. My husband and I recognized that the Project is a great opportunity not only for our family, but also for our community and the environment. Several factors informed

our support for the Project and our decision to sign on as participating landowners.
 Our knowledge and experience from many years of farming and from my husband's
 pipefitting career showed us how the Project will benefit our family by providing a
 steady source of income to supplement the living we make raising cattle on our farm.

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In addition to our own experiences, we did a great deal of research and visited
landowners actually living among wind turbines. I have a deep love for the land, our
family life on the farm, and the cattle that we raise as our primary source of income.
We would not be placing turbines on our land if doing so would negatively impact our
cattle or the health of our family.

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In addition to benefiting our family, the Project will greatly help our community
through increased tax revenue and a much-needed boost to the local economy. The
Project also provides a clean, renewable source of energy with undeniable benefits
to the environment, and society in general.

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Overall, we decided to sign with the Project because we believe it will be good for our family, our farm, our community, and the environment. Clark is our county seat and this Project would help restore and bring life back to our town, county and surrounding areas. We have been <u>offered</u> an opportunity to accomplish this!

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22 Q. Describe your interactions with Crocker and Geronimo Energy ("Geronimo").

A. Geronimo is a wonderful, wonderful company. I believe the Crocker and Geronimo
 people to be highly professional, with a commitment not only to the landowners, but
 to the community, as well. We have worked closely with the Project Manager, for
 whom we have the utmost respect, for over 3 1/2 years.

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My husband and I dropped in at the company's headquarters last summer, and were fortunate to personally meet its Founder, who is a farm boy himself and who came out of a meeting to make time for us, and several staff members. After only a few minutes, we were made to feel as if we were old friends who shared the same principles and values. Looking one another in the eye, a firm handshake, and the
giving of one's word was as binding as a legal, written contract when doing business
in days gone by . . . <u>that's</u> the feeling we shared. Our faith in this company was
strengthened and reinforced even more by our visit that day.

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6 This company's integrity is to be admired. They have worked tirelessly in effort to 7 respectfully accommodate tower placement requests of those not in the 8 Project. They have voluntarily conducted studies, which were not required, to show 9 that the health and welfare of the community <u>and</u> the environment will not be 10 harmed. This, too, affirms my consistent faith and trust in Crocker and Geronimo.

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12 Q. What does the Project mean for you and your family?

A. To our family, the Project means stability and investment in our future as well as in
 our community's future. The Project provides my family with an additional, stable
 source of income to supplement the living we make on our farm.

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Our primary source of income is raising beef cattle, but, as many farmers can relate, 17 18 times are not always easy. Due to the high interest rates of the 1980s, we would not 19 have been able to survive solely on our farm and agricultural income. In addition to 20 farming our land and raising our children, I have been employed by the Clark School 21 System for 25 years as a substitute teacher, and my husband had to work part-time 22 in the power plants, traveling the surrounding states. We experienced first-hand the 23 benefit of infrastructure development and expansion in our area when my husband 24 had the opportunity to build the Northern Border Pipeline pumping station in the 25 1990s, which is located approximately a mile and a quarter from our home.

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Wind is a new crop on our land that we have the right to harvest, and this Project allows us to do so. The Project will bring a stable source of income even in times of varying and often poor prices for commodities, unpredictable markets, weatherrelated hardships, and continued rising costs.

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Q. In your view, how will the Project benefit the community?

A. The Project is an opportunity to restore and revitalize our community. The closing of
McCain's Foods processing plant several years ago had a devastating effect on
Clark County and the surrounding area, from which they have never really
recovered. Businesses closed, families left, and school enrollment dropped. When
the Project was offered to Clark County approximately eight years ago, it was a ray
of hope that would help restore and bring back life to our town, our county, and the
surrounding areas.

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10 The Project will provide tax revenue and a much-needed boost to the local economy 11 through jobs and increased economic activity resulting from construction and 12 operation of the Project. The Project will create construction jobs, and the 13 construction workers will need housing, food, fuel, and maintenance for their 14 vehicles. All of this directly benefits local businesses. The tax revenue from the 15 Project can be put to great use improving the roads and funding our schools.

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In addition, the participating landowners will receive income that will be spent in the local community. My husband and I support our local Farmers' Elevator, veterinarians, Community Oil Co-op, and all the businesses in Clark, as do others participating in the Project. As a result, the Project will provide numerous benefits, not only to participating landowners, but to all members of this community.

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23 III. PROPERTY RIGHTS

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25 **Q.** There has been some discussion at the public hearing and in public 26 comments regarding landowner rights. Do you have a response?

A. Yes. Wind energy is the future, and there is a high demand and a great need for
clean, renewable energy. We own this land, we pay taxes on it, and we have the
right to use our land to bring this clean energy source to our community. In our 38
years of planting crops, no one has ever raised a ruckus about whether we plant
wheat or corn or oats or soybeans. Just like our other crops, wind is a crop on our

land that we have the right to harvest. No one else has the right to dictate our
 farming practices and income sources.
