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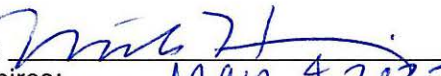

Some advice I have, is stay on top of your work but also make sure you have fun.

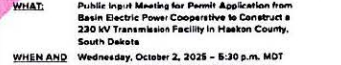
If you were told you couldn't graduate unless you could prove your achievements from the past four years, what three examples would you use?

A favorite memory of mine was when we were making butter in Mr. Johnson's and Myer threw his shoulder out when he was shaking the bottle.

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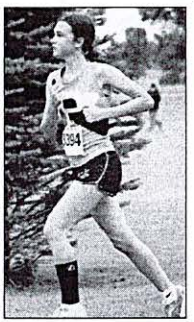

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Iron Sharpens Iron

Six days a week our Philip Scotties gather as one, seeking and motivating each other from the first year athlete to the most experienced, the very best in themselves as individuals and as a collective. Through our South Dakota weather at times makes both training and racing difficult (both Chamberlain and Lyman were cancelled this week due to wet conditions on their courses). Our Scotties make the adjustments needed daily, on varied terrain that has built our own "Dirt Track Champions". The Dogs gather bonding in intrasquad, friendly competition taking that team strength and unity out, testing it on many of South Dakota's toughest courses against the very best opponents as they know only iron sharpens iron.

Friday morning the Scotties gather in the AM for over an hour, opening with a game they call Kooch and what many might call a workout, the Scottie's term "meet prep" before leading the 11 white bus, pointing it East as the Scottie head for Huron and Saturday's Clyde Cotton Invitational. They face 26 South Dakota XC teams from B, A, and AA divisions on what will be the 2025 State Cross Country course in October.

Arrival on the Broadland Creek Course set the wheels in motion with temps in the low 60's, overcast skies with practically no breeze; this for most is considered near perfect race conditions. The Scottie elders began prep as they would race first today setting the example for our younger Scotties. The boys were lined up 115 deep on this challenging wet course. The path now well marked as 100 young ladies had trooped out a mile and led the Scotties at the front of the same cluster B. Burns now continued on 10

begin to converge over the first 400 meters from the 100 meter wide start line onto a 20 foot mowed path being led by the lead cart through the first group of curves. The lead group as they enter the curves still 5 and 6 wide saw senior Rayline Burns on the left edge and senior Jack Peterson on the right edge of the lead group. Senior David McKinley holding onto the lead group with 3 runners separation between McKinley and junior Aidan Craven. Though only a hand full of steps apart, the field is packed here and senior Craton Burns makes the same turn with junior Evan Henrie pacing in this cluster of nearly 20 runners as many quality athletes fight to maintain contact head out across this undulating course. B. Burns setting the early Scottie pace just inside the top 20 at the 1 mile mark. Peterson now in 23rd, McKinley at 34th, Craven in a pack of 8 all fighting to get into the top 40. C. Burns just a few strides and 3 spots back. Now the line begins to narrow as Henrie runs well up this long line of runners. They first plunge down a bridge and the first of 4 hill climbs we see long angular lines and B. Burns at 18, Peterson at 21, McKinley at 32, Craven now climbing the hill and moving into the top 40 on the incline. C. Burns now just two spots back and moving up, Henrie now climbing with J.V.C's Loewen Keegan. As long as he can close Peterson surged up the second hill and led the Scotties at the front of the same cluster B. Burns now continued on 10

The Philip Scotties ventured over to Kadoka on Friday, September 19, to take on the Knugers.

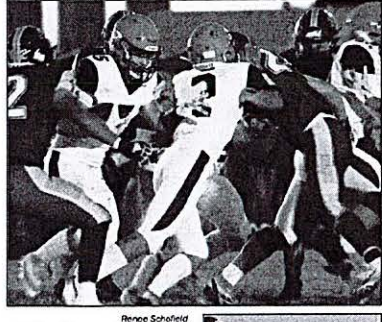
