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CHAIRMAN BURG: In the Matter of the Complaint Filed by Randy Kieffer, Sturgis,
South Dakota Against US West Communications, Inc.
Regarding Telephone Service Outages and Inadequate Service.

And TC99-002 is in the Matter of the Complaint filed by Randy Kieffer, Sturgis, South Dakota

Against US West Regarding Service Problems.

Today the Commission requests an update from the parties concerning the Complainant's current service.

Randy, do you want to update us on what your problems with the telecommunications service are.

MR. KIEFFER: For the last approximately two months we've had very intermittent service out there at the residence where I live and also at the other phone number. The Commission holds these cases open pending to see how service is going and everything and we go along good for a time period and then all the sudden everything quits.

Well, the last week, week and a half, the phone has worked good. But up until then the last two months before that it's been very intermittent service. Nobody could seem to find the problem.

1	Now they did replace the line from the granary
2	up to the other residence, house there, and that's
3	where all the phone problems have been coming from,
4	not from my home phone 347-7532 but from 347-9566.
5	The numbers are both listed in the Complaints
6	somewhere.
7	CHAIRMAN BURG: Are those both in
8	your name?
9	MR. KIEFFER: Yeah. And I put one
10	in my wife's name.
11	CHAIRMAN BURG: Are they to the same
12	residence?
13	MR. KIEFFER: No. We live about a
14	mile apart. The one in my wife's name is up at my
15	dad's.
16	CHAIRMAN BURG: Okay. Are these
17	dealing with the normal telephony, or are you
18	talking about Internet service?
19	MR. KIEFFER: Telephone. I'm not
20	even worried about Internet service because it
21	doesn't work if you don't have telephone.
22	CHAIRMAN BURG: US West, do you have
23	any response?
24	MS. SEVOLD: Mr. Chairman, this is
25	Colleen from Qwest Corporation. I have reviewed

the customer's account, and he has had some trouble reports in July and August. I have visited with the manager out there, and all the trouble we found were basically due to weather. We had a couple of lightening strikes on it and there was a problem with the housing and the wind had blown it.

We have a couple instances also in those months where we had -- it was caused by something other than -- I mean, it was not on the Qwest network. It was on the customer's premises itself. So a couple of those instances are those.

Our manager is continuing to monitor this. We have a very good technician that's very dedicated to it. And I think Mr. Kieffer would agree he is very responsive. So we are continually working on it.

CHAIRMAN BURG: You said there's some problems caused by wind. Is all of this line buried?

MS. SEVOLD: It was the housing, and the technician felt -- he felt sometimes the winds may blow that housing to the point where it would give a temporary out of service condition. So he wasn't sure about that so just to be sure he replaced the housing.

1	CHAIRMAN BURG: What's the housing?
2	A pedestal?
3	MS. SEVOLD: It's my understanding,
4	yes.
5	COMMISSIONER NELSON: Do you have
6	trouble reports that explain the difficulty and
7	what the problem and what you found?
8	MS. SEVOLD: I do have the trouble
9	reports in July and August. Yes, I do.
10	COMMISSIONER NELSON: Could we get
11	copies of those?
12	MS. SEVOLD: Could you have copies?
13	COMMISSIONER NELSON: Could we, yes.
14	MS. SEVOLD: Yes. As long as the
15	customer is agreeable to me releasing them, I would
16	be glad to furnish them.
17	MR. KIEFFER: No problem here.
18	CHAIRMAN BURG: Does staff have any
19	comments?
20	MS. CREMER: The only thing that
21	comes to mind, you know, I wasn't involved in this
22	from the get-go so I don't know what evidence you
23	have before you and I don't know if you have enough
24	evidence in the present Docket to make a decision
25	or if you need more.

So if what was discussed today -- do you want that to come in the record so that can also be considered as part of your decision? If you do, you could do it one of two ways. Mr. Kieffer could submit an affidavit. Qwest could respond to that. It's kind of -- they seem to be very agreeable maybe on what was done. So maybe that would work.

The other option I think you could do is actually do live testimony, you know, either do a hearing out in Rapid City or something and just take that portion of the testimony, reopen the record in that manner. That does cost Mr. Kieffer quite a bit of money to miss work and all of that and just continues to add to the damages here.

Or, like I said, if you have enough evidence you think currently in the record, then I don't know if you necessarily, you know -- you're not going to be able to consider this unless it's somehow put into the record, I guess, is my point.

COMMISSIONER NELSON: Well, I guess I think we need to have that stuff admitted in the record. So I'd be inclined to have a hearing.

MS. AILTS WIEST: Unless the parties would agree to submission of affidavits. I would ask the parties.

1	CHAIRMAN BURG: Probably just
2	another question. What time period are we talking
3	about, Mr. Kieffer for you know, that you're
4	mentioning in today's discussion? How do you
5	mean I mean, how long has this been, the period
6	you're talking about, having some outages?
7	I know you mentioned the last two weeks you
8	haven't had any problems.
9	MR. KIEFFER: (Inaudible) the
10	last week, yeah.
11	CHAIRMAN BURG: How long before
12	that?
13	MR. KIEFFER: About two months prior
14	to last week.
15	MS. SEVOLD: This is Colleen from
16	Qwest and according to our repair records, with the
17	exception of the last two months, we didn't have
18	any repair reports for about 14 months.
19	CHAIRMAN BURG: And in the last two
20	month's you did?
21	MS. SEVOLD: In the last two months
22	we have had a couple that were weather-related,
23	that is correct.
24	CHAIRMAN BURG: You feel that those
25	were corrected?

MS. SEVOLD: Yeah. The technician 1 went out there and did repairs so, yes, we believe 2 they were. 3 CHAIRMAN BURG: I don't know. I 4 quess, would the parties be willing to just sign 5 affidavits, or would you like to have another 6 hearing? 7 I know, Mr. Kieffer, it inconveniences you to 8 have to take off work for a hearing or something. 9 MR. KIEFFER: Yeah. Whatever I need 10 to do. 11 MS. CREMER: Maybe you could do 12 affidavits, and if it's a problem -- you know, if 13 it becomes -- you know, it's too much of a he said 14 15 she said type of situation where we can't resolve 16 it, then you could go to live testimony. We could see if everyone is agreeable with the 17 affidavits and if the evidence can come in that 18 19 way. 20 COMMISSIONER NELSON: Mr. Kieffer, do you have a preference for doing the live hearing 21 and testimony versus the affidavit? 22 MR. KIEFFER: It makes me no 23 difference. How do I do the affidavit? 24 25 CHAIRMAN BURG: What I would suggest

is staff contact you to talk about what you should 1 make sure you include in the affidavit. It's going 2 to be a sworn statement. Would that be accurate? 3 MS. CREMER: Right. 4 CHAIRMAN BURG: An affidavit would 5 be a sworn statement as to what happened, which 6 would be similar to what you would present in the 7 testimony. Since we've already had a hearing and 8 are familiar with the basis of this, we would like 9 to have an affidavit from you in place of probably 10 another hearing saying what the conditions have 11 been. And then Qwest would respond to the comments 12 in the affidavit. 13 COMMISSIONER NELSON: Does that 14 15 require Mr. Kieffer to get a lawyer to help him 16 draw up the affidavit, or are we helping him draw up the affidavit or what? 17 MS. CREMER: No. He can submit an 18 19 affidavit on his own. I can help him with the 20 format of it. 21 CHAIRMAN BURG: Right. Make sure 22 what's included in a good affidavit. MS. CREMER: That would make it 23 valid then. 24 25 COMMISSIONER NELSON: I don't know

prefer to have the testimony and show up and hear the problem, in my opinion. If you have a preference, I'm willing to personally go with what CHAIRMAN BURG: Like Karen said, if the result of the affidavit and the response isn't adequate, we could always have a hearing. COMMISSIONER NELSON: I quess my question to Mr. Kieffer is is he comfortable with the affidavit, or would he prefer to have the MR. KIEFFER: Well, I'd prefer to be in a hearing myself. Because that way if there's any clarification to be done, we can get it done and over with at that point. COMMISSIONER NELSON: Since, well he wants a hearing, I'm willing to go with a hearing. CHAIRMAN BURG: Okay. MS. SEVOLD: This is Colleen from Qwest Corporation. What we could do is do originally the affidavit and I would submit the repair reports that we have for the last two months and that way the Commission and staff could see exactly what the problems are and if the hearing

was needed further, we could do it after that point. COMMISSIONER NELSON: Unless Mr. Kieffer's changed his mind, I'm still inclined to do the hearing. CHAIRMAN BURG: I'm not sure that we gain that much more, at least initially. But if you want a hearing, we will try to schedule one. Is that your --MR. KIEFFER: Yeah. I'd rather try the hearing. CHAIRMAN BURG: Okay. This was just for an update on it so that we've gotten our update. We'll move forward.

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1	CHAIRMAN BURG: TC01-098, In the
2	Matter of Determining Prices for Unbundled Network
3	Elements in Qwest Corporation's Statement of
4	Generally Available Terms and Conditions.
5	Today shall the Commission grant AT&T's
6	position to intervene?
7	And I believe that goes to the Addendum; is
8	that right? It goes to part of the Addendum, which
9	also includes Midcontinent's petition to intervene.
10	And the second part of the question is it how shall
11	the Commission proceed.
12	Let's take the first part first, and then is
13	there any comments on the petition to intervene
14	from AT&T or Midcontinent?
15	MS. SEVOLD: Mr. Chairman, this is
16	Colleen from Qwest. We have no comments, no
17	objections.
18	CHAIRMAN BURG: Okay. Either one of
19	the parties have a comment?
20	MR. GERDES: This is Dave Gerdes. I
21	represent Midcontinent and would stand by for any
22	questions, but we, of course, ask for the
23	intervention.
24	CHAIRMAN BURG: Okay. I will move
25	we grant intervention to Midcontinent Cable,

Midcontinent Telecommunications; is that right, and 1 to AT&T. 2 3 COMMISSIONER NELSON: And I'd 4 concur. CHAIRMAN BURG: So intervention has 6 been granted to these two parties. The second part 7 of the question is how shall the Commission 8 proceed? 9 We at this time will entertain comments on 10 procedurals from the parties involved. I'll start 11 with Owest. 12 MS. SEVOLD: Thank you, 13 Mr. Chairman. This is Mary Hobson from the 14 Stoel Rives Law Firm. I'm representing Qwest on 15 this matter. As I think the Commission is aware, what we 16 17 are seeking is permanent TELRIC based rates for our 18 unbundled network elements in this Docket. This is 19 the subject that you're probably aware that has 2.0 received a lot of attention around the Qwest 21 region, and we're hoping to make the South Dakota 22 proceedings as simple and straight forward as 23 possible. Qwest's proposal for doing this is contained 24 25 in the Petition that we filed with you in late

July. One of the features of our proposal is the rates that the Commission developed in the arbitration with AT&T could be adopted as permanent rates for the UNEs that were priced at that time.

If that proposal were acceptable to the Commission and the prices -- and to the other parties, we would still need some process, however, since there are a myriad of other new unbundled network elements and interconnection arrangements that have come about since the time that arbitration was completed.

So whether or not there is eventually a stipulation on the status of the arbitrated rates, we still need a process to establish new prices here in South Dakota. In this regard we have suggested a two-phase process. The first phase consisting of a series of collaborative workshops, and those workshops would have two major objectives in our view, at least.

They would create a forum for the parties to reach mutually acceptable agreements that would serve to narrow the issues. For example, there may be a stipulation on certain UNE prices. There may be stipulations about certain inputs of cost models or the use of particular cost models and so on.

That's going to help a lot in narrowing the issues that ultimately will have to be decided.

Secondly, they provide an informal opportunity for the parties and especially the staff and those parties who have not been participating in these cases in our jurisdictions to learn about this pricing costing procedure and to get some help running cost models if that's something that they choose to do.

And this, Mr. Chairman, brings me to one of the big issues that we're urging the Commission to take up sooner rather than later in this proceeding and that is to establish whether any other party is going to offer an alternative cost model to the cost model and cost studies that have already been provided by Qwest.

As I said, this is something that we encourage you to get to sooner rather than later because it will make a very big difference as to how the parties and the staff proceed and will have a huge impact on the scope of the issues. We believe that either way, whether there is another competing model offered in opposition to the Qwest model or not, the collaborative process is helpful.

If, for example, we are only looking at the

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Qwest cost model and Qwest cost studies, the collaborative process allows the parties the opportunity to learn about it and use it themselves. But in addition to that, Qwest is willing in this proposed informal stage of the proceedings to provide results using other cost models, for example, the AJI model and to provide the results from other jurisdictions.

Of course, it would not be our advocacy that the parties should rely on those or the Commission should rely on those but that helps to give a perspective to the staff and parties as to how if we were to have a full-blown discussion about cost models, how that might affect the prices that you're looking at.

If we know that, for example, AT&T will be offering its cost models, then the collaborative process on the other hand provides a forum where the results can be compared, different versions of the models developing, using different inputs and so on can be compared with each other in an informal process that, again, sort of gives the parties protective highlights, whether they're areas of common agreement and so on. So in either case we believe that a collaborative process will

be very helpful to the staff and to the other parties.

Ultimately the purpose, as I said, is to narrow the issues and to set the stage for more formal proceedings. We propose that the formal stage be limited to those issues, and we sincerely hope there will be a narrowing of issues by that point that remain after the collaborative phase is completed. And those would be, of course, the issues that actually require contested case proceedings.

So I'd like to summarize as follows. The Commission is taking an important step today by getting us together and hearing from everyone as to how they would like to proceed. Because AT&T has intervened and because their model has been introduced to many but not all proceedings of this type across the Qwest region, we strongly urge the Commission to set a near term deadline for all parties to declare their intention to rely on alternative cost models. This must be done for the parties to have an efficient and meaningful discussion of these issues, whether or not the collaborative process is adopted.

Qwest then urges the Commission to adopt the

collaborative process for a first phase to allow narrowing of the issues, to allow all the parties to get up to speed on the model or models being introduced and to facilitate the discovery process.

One of the objectives is to see if the parties are willing to stipulate on the use of arbitrated rates. Another early objective should be to define the -- to the extent possible, the issues that really matter in South Dakota and what we're going to focus on in this jurisdiction as opposed to the others that have already started proceeding.

Finally, we think some of the -- some form of formal process is going to be necessary after the collaboratives to finally settle those issues that we can't reach agreement on.

I would be happy to answer any questions the Commission or any of the parties have. Just by way of introduction to myself, I will let you know that I am also representing Qwest in UNE cost dockets in the state of Idaho, which is my home state, where a collaborative process has begun and I am representing Qwest in Utah in a process that is not so informal. It's a more formal process, but it is focused at this point on the new UNE.

So I have some perspective on how Qwest has

been approaching these issues in other jurisdictions and that may be helpful to you. Thanks.

CHAIRMAN BURG: Thank you. Any questions that might help clarify before we have comments from others? That was a rather long statement so there must have been some questions in there.

If not, AT&T.

MR. WEIGLER: This is Steve Weigler from AT&T. Only purchasing a limited number of -- (Inaudible) -- mostly in Nebraska, I'm not sure how much a collaborative process will really move this matter forward. I would think the Commission would want to have as much intervention as possible in cost issues and would want to have knowledge of the parties' positions throughout.

So to bring this to like an informal workshop proceeding doesn't seem to be getting any of the parties really anywhere. I mean, even just from my knowledge of what's occurred in Nebraska, we usually don't agree on a cost model so -- and I don't see that this would be any different.

The parties usually don't agree on cost. So it's not like -- (Inaudible) -- for an

interconnection discussion where there's certainly things the parties would agree on. And I would think the Commission would want as much intervention as possible.

Not being familiar with any kind of collaborative process I bet questions of attorney representing -- there's one going on in Idaho. I believe most of the Commissions have had formal proceedings. However AT&T is open to whatever the Commission feels is the most efficient way and the most -- provides the due process necessary in this process.

CHAIRMAN BURG: Does AT&T anticipate introducing another cost model?

MR. WEIGLER: Mr. Commissioner, I have not met with our cost people at this time to even know the extent we'll be involved.

CHAIRMAN BURG: Okay. Midcontinent.

MR. GERDES: Mr. Chairman and
Commissioner Nelson, Midcontinent tends to favor
the course of action suggested by Qwest, that is
that we go through the series of informal
workshops, work through the collaborative process,
identify the issues, and then file prefiled
testimony and litigate the issues that actually are

1 issues. CHAIRMAN BURG: Okay. Any other 2 party? Those are the only parties to this Docket; 3 correct? MS. AILTS WIEST: Yes. 5 CHAIRMAN BURG: Staff, do you have 6 any comments? 7 MS. CREMER: Staff would just note 8 that it appears the interveners are going to be 9 participating on a very limited basis and, 10 therefore, we believe that the hiring of a 11 12 consultant may be needed regardless of whether 13 staff ultimately sits as a party or if we sit with the Commission like we did in the arbitration. 14 15 But I think, as Qwest pointed out, you know, 16 that may be an alternative cost model comes from --17 CHAIRMAN BURG: Would you see the 18 hiring of this consultant before this informal 19 collaborative or after? I mean, to be included in 20 the informal meetings? MS. CREMER: I guess I'm not real 21 22 sure what this collaborative process involves. You know, is it one or two things, and it's kind of 23 generic. Do we go to Denver and Seattle or 24 25 wherever and learn how -- I mean, I'm not sure.

1	guess I'm not clear what they mean by this process.
2	COMMISSIONER NELSON: I'm sort of
3	disappointed that AT&T didn't have any idea of how
4	they wanted to proceed today. So I guess the other
5	intervener feels you ought to go with Qwest's way.
6	CHAIRMAN BURG: Is it staff's
7	feeling we ought to go with the meetings as well?
8	Do you support the proposal by Qwest?
9	MS. CREMER: Would that be our cost
10	people that would be attending that? Because would
11	that be like Harlan and Heather and Keith? I'm not
12	sure. Would they be flying off somewhere, or do
13	they come here to South Dakota and bring all of
14	their people here and everybody sits in on that?
15	I'm not clear.
16	MS. SEVOLD: Mr. Chairman, may I
17	respond to that?
18	MS. AILTS WIEST: I was just
19	assuming that we aren't flying anywhere and Qwest
20	is coming here for the informal workshops.
21	CHAIRMAN BURG: Do you want to
22	respond to that?
23	MS. SEVOLD: Thank you,
24	Mr. Chairman. Yes. That is our intention, that
25	Qwest would be bringing its people to South Dakota.

It would be bringing its model, its modeling experts, if that's necessary, to help anyone that is attempting to use the Qwest model or has questions about our models and so on to actually give them hands-on help.

Now, obviously, that is very much an informal mode. But there is no expectation that this is going to be happening in ex parte contact with an attempt to exclude anyone that is interested in participating.

What we have seen is that by working in this way with a state staff that is attempting to prepare itself to take a position in a formal proceeding, this is very helpful because I think, for example, the Idaho staff is in a similar mode to, I believe, where the South Dakota staff, that is that you haven't had a lot of cost proceedings previously. You don't have a -- haven't developed a lot of expertise in-house.

And I have not actually formed a lot of opinions about exactly how you would like to proceed with pricing here. So this is at least in the Idaho case something that was designed to specifically help the Idaho staff, but it also included the other parties.

Frankly, in Idaho I believe that AT&T has not yet decided whether or not it's going to be offering HAI. So, again, we have been allowing the Idaho staff to look at HAI, not that we try to stop them. But in helping them with that we've been providing them with results from other jurisdictions of both our model and other models and so on and so forth simply to put this huge kind of issue in perspective.

Mr. Weigler is right that there have been formal proceedings virtually everywhere and we certainly don't think that we're going to avoid formal proceedings entirely but we hope maybe we can cut down on the scope and that we can get the parties up to speed and the staff up to speed by doing this informal process first.

COMMISSIONER NELSON: Mr. Chairman, it seems to me if the staff wants a consultant, the staff ought to be involved in the workshops and stuff too.

MS. CREMER: Harlan, I don't know if you have an opinion one way or the other on the consultant from the get-go. It seems like it would be useful, rather than bringing them in after the workshops and then bringing them up to speed.

CHAIRMAN BURG: What my suggestion 1 is is you find out as much about the structure as 2 you can and make a request for the consultant. 3 Bring a request for the consultant based on what 4 5 you find out, the timeframes, as much as you can. And then we'll act on that consult. 6 7 Because I don't think we're in objection to 8 the consult. I think it's rather narrow. We need 9 to understand what we're doing. 10 COMMISSIONER NELSON: Owest doesn't 11 see the Commissioners being involved in the 12 workshop? 13 CHAIRMAN BURG: No. We'll have to 14 make a decision. 15 MR. WEIGLER: I just have one quick 16 question. Would the workshops involve transcripts? 17 Would transcripts be made of those workshops? 18 COMMISSIONER NELSON: Probably not, 19 would they? 20 MS. AILTS WIEST: I would just ask 21 Qwest what their opinion is on that question. 22 MS. HOBSON: We are very flexible on 23 how these proceed. We have not used transcripts in 24 Idaho, but I don't think we have an objection to 25 doing that. It's just, as I pointed out, we're

trying to proceed very informally here so it's 1 2 probably not a thing that would develop a very 3 helpful transcript but certainly if there were going to be presentations or so on and someone 4 5 wanted to have those transcribed, that would 6 probably make sense. 7 COMMISSIONER NELSON: Qwest is 8 paying for the transcripts? 9 CHAIRMAN BURG: Are you doing the 10 informal portion in Idaho? MS. HOBSON: Yes. 11 12 CHAIRMAN BURG: AT&T, are you 13 participating in those in Idaho? 1.4 MR. WEIGLER: Mr. Commissioner, I 15 have no idea. I can find out. 16 CHAIRMAN BURG: If there's a 17 parallel there, you should have some idea how well 18 it works. MR. WEIGLER: I can find out about 19 that, and I apologize for not knowing. The issue 20 and an issue with AT&T, there are probably at least 21 22 10 cost proceedings going on all over the Qwest 23 region and, you know, we at AT&T as large a corporation as we are, we have limited resources to 24 25 staff them.

And so to be candid with the Commission, I'm not sure what the extent we'll be involved in this proceeding or other proceedings around the country with so much going on with the Qwest 271 effort and their need to establish permanent pricing in every one of the 14 states.

CHAIRMAN BURG: Are there any other comments on how the Commission should proceed?

MR. GERDES: Well, Mr. Chairman,
Dave Gerdes on behalf of Midcontinent. It seems to
me the Commission is headed in the right direction
and that is let's find out what we're talking about
first and then if you need a consultant, that will
be something we can look at but I think we need a
little more information on exactly how this is
going to be structured and then we can go forward
accordingly.

MS. AILTS WIEST: Well, do the parties want to talk about how the structure is? I'm kind of trying to figured out what kind of order I can put out on this. It's not like I'm going to be setting any dates or informal workshops.

At this point I would recommend the Commission encourage the parties to get together and pursue

1	the formal workshops at this point and for staff to
2	see if they can come up with a consult and proposal
3	to bring before the Commission.
4	MR. GERDES: Just to follow up on
5	that, it seems to me that can be the first we talk
6	about at the first informal session is the
7	MS. AILTS WIEST: The process?
8	MR. GERDES: Exactly.
9	CHAIRMAN BURG: Is it my
10	understanding we would not need to develop a
11	procedure schedule for the inform hearings?
12	MS. AILTS WIEST: Right. At this
13	point everybody has to work out with their own
14	schedule. So I don't see us actually setting up
15	any dates or times at this point.
16	CHAIRMAN BURG: Okay. That would
17	just be by agreement among the parties?
18	MS. AILTS WIEST: Right. Perhaps
19	the parties would get together and talk it over,
20	they could come and report back to the Commission
21	as to what their process is and how they set it up.
22	CHAIRMAN BURG: Is that agreeable
23	with Qwest?
24	MS. HOBSON: Yes, Chairman. I think
25	that's probably a good idea at this point. We

believe that eventually we will want to see a procedural schedule so that this doesn't just kind of spin off into nowhere. But I think that given the questions that you've heard today, it makes sense for us to get together and talk about what makes sense for this particular group because Qwest doesn't have a set proposal here.

We are willing to be very flexible and talk about whatever will be useful to people. And what is working in Idaho may not be what works somewhere else. But we're willing to talk about what will work. So that's basically the message I want to leave with everyone.

CHAIRMAN BURG: Any other comments?

If not, we will leave it up to the parties to establish informal collaborative sessions, and then we will develop a procedural schedule after those occur. We'll leave it to staff to determine the need for a consultant and the parameters around that.
